NOTED EDUCATORS AT SCHOOL.

Specialists of National Reputation Are Among the Instructors at O. A. C.
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 20.—Dr. Willim T. Rawden, specialist in industrial education of the U. S. Bureau of Education, Mrs. L. W. Robbins, supervisor of Home Economics at Oakland, Cal., Miss Alice Ravenhill, formerly of Kings College, London—an international authority on domestic science—and Dr. W. J. Eikenberry, of the University of Chicago, specialist in general science, are among the instructors secured for summer school work at O. A. C.
Dr. Rawden is one of the leading authorities on vocational education in the United States. His work has carried him to many different parts of the country where he has had an opportunity to inspect the scope and quality of industrial education as conducted by the leading schools of the United States. In this way he has been enabled to unite the value of his special knowledge to the most successful practice to be found anywhere in America and thereby develop a form of training in theory and practice both correct.
Mrs. Robbins was formerly connected with the Extension Service at

O. A. C. In this capacity she traversed the state in many parts and gave special attention to the work being done in the line of home economics and home making. For the last two years she has been supervisor of home economics work in the Oakland, Cal., public schools.
Miss Ravenhill was one of the instructors of Farmers' Week last winter. She is an international authority on the physical requirements and scientific sanitation of the human race, and an author of note. She has specialized particularly in the physical and moral activities of childhood and their relation to their training in the home and school.
Ten members of the regular faculty offer twenty-seven courses for teachers of manual training. In home economics eight faculty members are conducting work. Four of the faculty of the school of commerce carry eleven courses in these subjects. Agriculture is offered by seven instructors in nine different courses. In addition to this there are four courses conducted in industrial application—in biology, chemistry, physics and general science; six courses in chemistry; two in physics; two in botany; three in education; five in English; three in history; and four in elementary mathematics. The session opened for registration last Monday and class work began Tuesday morning.

Pendleton Wants Normal School

Pendleton, Or., June 19.—A constitutional amendment for the establishment of a normal school at Pendleton will be presented to the voters of Oregon at the election in November. A provision in the proposed amendment validates the present locations of the University of Oregon, the Oregon Agricultural college and the Monmouth and Ashland normal schools. The petition was presented to the secretary of state at Salem Saturday for his approval of title and form. The provision validating the location of the four present schools was inserted because that all state institutions be established at the seat of government.
At the recent institute of teachers from Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties held here, resolution was unanimously adopted

Farm Home Is Burned

Kelso, Wash., June 19.—The farmhouse on the Oscar Peterson place, in the Shanghai neighborhood, was totally destroyed by fire Friday evening. The contents, belonging to Ben Guier and family, were almost a total loss. A spark from the chimney alighting on the roof is supposed to have started the blaze.

Rose Show at Kelso

Kelso, Wash., June 19.—Under the management of the Ladies' Aid society of the Christian church, Kelso Saturday held its first rose show. There was a fine street parade in which only children participated. Many baby carriages, wheelbarrows and push carts were handsomely decorated with roses and the show attracted a large crowd along the streets.

Berries Bring Good Prices

Springbrook, Or., June 19.—The Springbrook Canning Co. has been shipping strawberries for the Fruit Growers' union and reports that there have been received good returns for the crop. Although the crop was light the growers will receive considerable more for the berries per crate than in previous years.
