Cherry Fair to Open at Salem
Salem, Or., June 19.—Announcement has been made of the program for the cherry fair which will be held this year on July 3. It will open with the crowning of the queen at 9:30 and immediately following this event will come the baby parade. At 10:30 o'clock, at Marion square, the All-Oregon grange program will be held. Mayor White will make the address of welcome and prominent men will speak.
The features of the afternoon will be the automobile and farmers' parade at 1:30 o'clock, and sports and a baseball game. The game will be between the Lojus and the Battling Bradfords. In the evening at 7:30 o'clock the parent "Hiawatha" will be put on at Willson park.
Salem is also planning to receive no less than 10,000 people at the

state fair grounds on July 4 at the All-Oregon celebration. The forenoon will be devoted to patriotic band and vocal music, and address by Charles W. Fulton and various kinds of games, drills and contests. Hundreds of seats and tables are being placed in the grove. A dancing floor to accommodate 500 at a time will be under shelter. A pioneer reunion and campfire will be had and the Indiana society of Salem will have a state reunion of Hoosiers. One-hundred plug uglies will parade at night and then dance the old-fashioned Quadrille to the fiddlers' music."
