Rattlesnake in Coyote's Stomach.
Coyotes are predatory by reputation and destroy annually sheep, chickens and small farm stock, but occasionally there is evidence that they prey upon pests. E. F. Averill of the biological survey has received a report from Frank Reed, a government trapper at Trinidad, Wn., to the effect that on June 6 he found a rattlesnake in the stomach of a coyote he had killed. Another report was received of a magpie being found in a coyote stomach. The coyotes, particularly the pups, also eat large quantities of grasshoppers. The government trappers are required to examine the stomachs of all animals they kill.

Grain Hurt Some.
That the grain around Pilot Rock was hurt some by the recent hot weather is the report brought in yesterday by L. K. Harlan, editor of the Pilot Rock Record. Previous to the warm weather he states that the grain was looking fine but that there are indications that some of it was burned last week.

Chief Iron Tail Dead.
Chief Iron Tail, the Indian whose head A. Phimister Proctor, local sculptor, put in bronze and which has also been preserved upon the buffalo nichels, died several days ago in the east. He was with a circus and, becoming ill, was placed on the train with his squaw to be sent to his tribe. He died en route.

PETERSON IS ENTHUSIASTIC

PENDLETON MAN SEES CERTAINTY FOR WILSON.

Pendleton News Items of Various Sorts and Nature.

Pendleton, June 20.—Back from St. Louis where he helped to renominate President Woodrow Wilson as the standard bearer of the Democratic party, Will M. Peterson declares that he has not the faintest doubt but that the people will return Wilson to the presidential chair next November.

"The convention was the most harmonious in the history of the party," he said. "Everyone was for Wilson first, last and all the time and there was not a discordant note in the whole convention. Some thought that Bryan came to the convention to try to in-

sert strong prohibition and woman suffrage planks in the platform. Bryan, however, declared he was there as a humble newspaperman only and would not attempt to dictate to the convention. He made a 45-minute speech and every delegate in the convention with the single exception of Charles Murphy stood on chairs and cheered him to the echo."

Mr. Peterson states that there was nothing but harmony in the Oregon delegation from start to finish, even to the seating of Easterly as national committeeman.

He reports prosperity all through Kansas and Nebraska and signs of it everywhere. Factories were running and displaying signs of "Men Wanted," he said and there were no idle men to be found. Crops are two weeks backward, he said, but Kansas expects to harvest one hundred million bushels.

Mr. Peterson was surprised to wake up this morning and find snow all about him at Huntington.
