BARS CLEARED OF GIRLS.

St. Paul Police Start Campaign and Increase Detectives.

St. Paul, June 30.—Augmenting St. Paul's so-called purity squad by two additional detectives, police began the other night what is said to be a determined move to clean up city streets and wine rooms frequented by young girls.

Six detectives started the crusade. Detective Joseph Beaubien and Patrick Smith were transferred from the Prior avenue district and assigned to work with Detectives Herman Vall, Henry Cummings, Joseph Pugleusa and Thomas McMahon.

Early that night they were called in conference with Henry McColl, Commissioner of Public Safety, and John J. O'Connor, Chief of Police, and were assigned beats in the downtown district.

The campaign, it is said, first will be one of warning, but failure to observe the letter of the law will mean quick arrest.

LORILLARDS CONTINUE PAY.

Employees Called Out in Guard Also to Have Jobs Kept Open.

New York, June 28.—A letter written by Thomas J. Maloney, president of P. Lorillard company, to each of the company's employees who are members of the National Guard says: "A number of this company's employees who are members of the National Guard of various states, have made an immediate response to the call of the President, and have gone, or are about to go to camp with their respective commands, in preparation for service on the border or in Mexico.

"These men are actuated by a high sense of patriotism and a fine public spirit. This company is proud of their unhesitating response to the call of duty and of the sacrifices which they will undergo for the common good. The company has every confidence that their services so freely given will reflect credit for all time upon themselves and upon the company.

"These men may feel assured that their positions with the company will be held open for them and that their salaries will be paid in full. The employees' bounty plan will also remain in operation with respect to them.

"This arrangement will continue in effect at least until January 1, 1917, at which time the matter will again be considered by the directors of the company."

BOY OUTLASTS IN SPELLING.

Professor Can't Find Words That Lad Does Not Know.

Winona, Minn., June 29.—Winona county has a boy who couldn't be spelled down by Professor George F. Howard, of the University of Minnesota.

Clinton Sperbeck, of Dakota village, spelled every word offered him by Mr. Howard in the rural school graduation exercises at the Winona State Normal School.

He remained standing after more than 50 boys and girls from the county took their seats because of faulty spelling.

Sperbeck, attending the little Dakota school, had been ill with measles and scarcely was able to leave his home on the day of the graduation. He came, however, and went home with the title of the best speller in Winona county. He is 14 years old.

Elsie Witt, 13 years old, of Minnesota City, won the written spelling contest, and also won a distinctive title.

Marian Eckert, 11 years old, was the youngest pupil entered and she was second in the written contest. Here home also is in Minnesota City.
