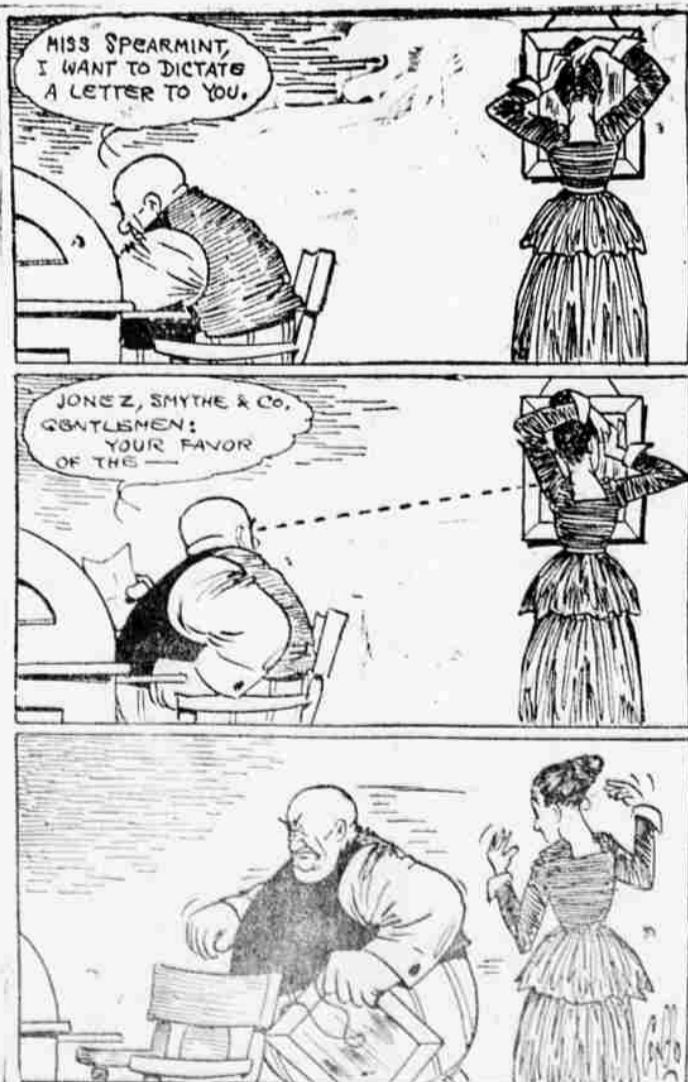
#### Kept Hands Clean and Fed Pigs.
