usual London itinerary, and the news-

"Be Prepared." Display windows of
these outfitters shops are constantly
filled with patent life belts while the
newspapers are reaping a harvest of
advertisements pointing out the rela-
tive merits of "Somebody's Patent
Waistcoat." A news column also is
occasionally devoted to a new inven-
tion which appears like an ordinary
suit of clothes but is capable of float-
ing the heaviest man. Here is a sam-
ple of "ad" from a big London daily
which injects a doubt into the mind of
the most intrepid civilian sea dog!
"Do not rely on death trap life belts
which turn unconscious wearers face
downward and drown them. Remem-
ber the Maloja and Sussex disasters.
Our waistcoat makes drowning im-
possible by turning the wearer when
he ceases to struggle. It has saved
hundreds of lives from the Lusitania,
Palaba, Costello, Royal Edward, In-
dia, Persia, Galicia and other well
known disasters." The "ad" is fortif-
ied by illustrations showing the "un-
conscious" survivor floating serenely
on his back while others (who failed
to go prepared) are maneuvering
through the preliminaries of a watery
death. One manufacturer of life sav-
ing waistcoats quotes in his "ad" for
the experiences of a real life
Lord who owes his present status to
his foresight in purchasing a waist-
coat before venturing on the Mediter-
ranean. There are many and diverse
models of life saving waistcoats. In-
quiry today elicited that the sale of
all models since the latest German
submarine campaign, has been enorm-
ous. Some models may be worn as
an ordinary vest. The prospective
survivor has only to reach down and
extract a little tube, with a valve at-
tached, from somewhere in his shirt
front. When danger comes he simply
inflates the vest like a football and
he is ready for the worst. All trav-
elers from England wear their waist-
coats day and night while in the dan-
ger zones. The American who leaves
London without this little necessity is
in a class by himself.

King Gives Bull Fighting Blow.

Madrid, July 3.—King Alfonso, a
keen advocate of horse racing, is tak-
ing advantage of the European war
to popularize the sport of Spain.
Spanish bull-fighting, like American
baseball, now the national pastime,
will have a rival within a few years
if the people take kindly to the King's
efforts. He has purchased three Eng-
lish two year olds and has entered in-
to competition with the Duke of To-
ledo, Spain's leading horse fancier.
The first official race for the King's
golden cup was held at Can Sebastian,
the historic town, which may
eventually become the Spanish New-
market.

Rostad and Herlow to Seek Parole

Salem, Or., July 1.—When the
parole board meets here Monday,
Hance Rostad, serving a term in the
penitentiary for forgery committed
while serving as cashier of the Mult-
nomah State bank, of Lents, will ap-
pear before it to ask for a parole.

Rostad was convicted in Mult-
nomah county, and according to Su-
perintendent of Banks Sargent he
was short about \$22,000 in his ac-
counts, and has never made restitu-
tion. He was sentenced to a term of
from two to 20 years. He was re-
ceived at the prison May 11, 1915,
and has served a little more than a
year of his sentence. Representa-
tives of the bank may protest
against the board granting clemency
and it is barely possible also that the
superintendent of banks may make
a protest. The latter feels that Rostad
should serve his minimum sen-
tence before being paroled.

At the same meeting, E. C. Herlow,
of Portland, serving a term from
Multnomah for larceny by bailes, will
also apply for clemency. He was
convicted with W. H. Chapin, who
was conditionally pardoned early in
1915 by ex-Governor West.
