Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Haladay and Mr. and Mrs. Fitts were parties arriving by auto from Baker today en route to Pendleton. They were joined here by Don Sargent who will put in a day or two across the mountains on business.

City Manager's Report.

To the Commission: The fire department had one call to A. Stewart's home on C avenue, July 1st. Everybody was to the Obitauqua or down town. The fire gained considerable headway before it was discovered. The house and contents were quite badly damaged. Loss covered by insurance. The fire was probably caused by an overheated cook stove.

The water superintendent spent \$17.25 on repair work; \$5.75 for taps; \$46 for reading meters and attending shut-off work during the absence of the superintendent at the intake and \$13.75 for a man at the intake.

The street superintendent had a man and team for \$28.50; a white wing five and a fourth days for \$13.12. He purchased cross walk lumber for \$4.72 for repairs and \$2.65 for sidewalk repairs. Had a half a day's work by a prisoner. He repaired a cross walk on Palmer and Third and a small bridge at Third and I, and fixed up road from there toward Deal's canyon. This included a small culvert.

The recorder received \$42.50 fines and forfeitures; \$3.00 for the sale of city maps; \$10 for dog licenses and 50 cents for one building permit. He issued dry licenses on treasurer's receipts of \$40 and pool license on receipt of \$35. He issued a warrant on the water fund for \$1.96, \$80.71 on the Contingent fund on paid outs for June. He issued a warrant for \$875 for interest in City hall and Sewer bonds. He issued a warrant on the Imp. District Interest fund for \$568.24 interest on coupons eight bonds Nos. 385, and 396 to 425; coupons five bonds Nos. 604 to 610 and 652, and one for \$30 on District No. 99 Interest fund, coupons one, bonds Nos. 1 and 2 District No. 99. He also drew a warrant for \$999.53 on the B. C. F. L. Sinking fund for warrants Nos. 1891, 91 92, 94, 95, 96, 98, 17000, 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, 19, 20, 21, 22, 25, 33, 42 and 43. Discount was \$20.40. He issued a warrant for \$111.90 on the Library fund on vouchers No. 367 to 371.

The treasurer received \$231.50 water rents; \$117.20 Imp. Dist. installment \$75.75 Imp. District Interest; \$1.55 Interest District No. 91; 80 cents Interest District No. 96; \$4.35 Interest Sewer one Section five; \$35 pool and \$40 dry license. He received \$204 from the Recorder being the June receipts of his office. He paid \$15.21 water warrants; \$34.95 Road warrants; \$20.71 Contingent warrant; \$13.92 interest Sewer one Section five; \$397.82 general fund warrants with \$49.55 interest on

same and \$111.90 Library warrants. June water collections were \$2084.20, for June 1915 they were \$2022.62.

The police arrested 25 during the week. One was arrested for the state, five were drunk and fifteen were violators of the speed ordinance. They served 10 meals and collected

\$42.50 fines. Had four sleepers and used one extra man the full time. A mesh band bag was picked up on Adams avenue and is held at the police office.
