Indian Mission Wants Students Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 6.—Students of agricultural colleges, who have trained in foreign missionary work, are wanted by foreign missionary boards to conduct agricultural demonstrations and educational work in India.

"The Honorable Claude Hill," says the report issued by the Presbyterian Board of Missions, "who is a member of the Viceroy cabinet for agriculture, has suggested that the missions help in getting out men with practical experience for government demonstration in agriculture.

"The government of India is introducing short courses in agriculture into the rural schools. This work is being started with three men who have been trained and will continue with twenty more men this summer."

A number of O. A. C. students have taken the work to qualify for foreign service in rural agriculture. They are being informed of the present demand as rapidly as possible. Following are types of men called for: "One man strong in desert problems and irrigation for the desert state of Bikaner. The Maharajah has passed orders that he is to have a budget to carry on his work. The Bikaner state will pay his salary, travel, outfit, allowances, etc., on a missionary basis. There is much to be said in favor of a young married man whose wife could visit the women in the Palace."

"One man, Bombower or another for the work in horticulture. Salary raised on the field."

Heavy Rains Make Bad Roads Philomath, Ore., July 5.—Many touring parties, on their way by motor cars to Newport and Nye Beach, have been held up by the muddy roads west of Philomath. Just preceding the recent hard rains the road to Newport was in good condition, having recently been graded and smoothed down for practically its entire length, but as much of the road is without a covering of gravel the red clay soil became very muddy and slippery following the downpour.

A few days' dry weather will put the road in fairly good condition again. One party from Portland, with a big load of passengers and camp equipment, broke down just beyond Wren and was laid up for several days making repairs to the car. A stripped differential gear caused the trouble.
