is said, they would have produced enough meat to furnish every family in the United States with 40 pounds of pork.

Despite these facts the United States remains the greatest meat-eating as well as the greatest meat producing nation in the world. Approximately twice as much meat is consumed in this country as in Germany before the war and the total normal consumption in Russia, Great Britain and France is less than in Germany. The per capita consumption is also far greater in this country than anywhere else with the exception of Australia and New Zealand.

Our own exports now consist largely of pork and pork products and these are derived to a great extent from corn. In the fiscal years 1914 and 1915 we imported more fresh, chilled, and frozen beef and mutton than we exported, and more beef of all descriptions was imported in 1914, than was exported. In this limited respect we have joined the great majority. Practically the whole of the world's export trade in meat is maintained by nine countries—Argentina, Australia, Canada, Denmark, Mexico, under normal conditions, New

Zealand, the United States and Uruguay.

Baker, July 10.—Occupants of an auto plying between Baker and Wingville at 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning, miraculously escaped injury when their car turned turtle while going at a good rate of speed. A blowout, coming just as a corner was being turned, was the cause of the accident.

Ed. Luney, Elmer Heard and Carl Cloud, all of Baker, were in the car as it capsized, the last named being at the wheel. All were caught under the machine, but in spite of the fact that the wind shield and top were virtually ruined all were able to crawl unaided from beneath the wreckage.
