# UMATILLA'S HARVEST LATE

## CLOSE TO FOUR MILLION BUSHELS ESTIMATED.

Recent Rains Pull Fading Grain Crop Out of Failure.

Pendleton, July 11.—Though harvest in Umatilla county will be from ten days to a fortnight late in starting, it will prove a bigger one when finished than anyone had any reason to expect a few weeks ago. This is the consensus of opinion among grain buyers, farmers and others familiar with crop conditions.

The cold spring had the effect of delaying the grain considerable and a short time ago conditions were anything but promising. However, the recent rains followed by the warm days of the past week have brought out the crops wonderfully, especially in the lighter land sections, and the yield will not fall far short of the normal if weather conditions continue to be favorable.

At the present time the wheat and barley is ripening very rapidly and farmers are getting their combines in readiness. Usually cutting begins in most of the wheat lands about July 20 and a little earlier around Echo, but this year there will be very little cutting of wheat before August 1. The barley crop will be even later than the wheat crop, according to authorities.

Right now every farmer in the county is in midst of his hay harvest and they are "making hay while the sun shines" and before and after the sun sets. Delayed by the unseasonable weather, they are making up for lost time. As a usual thing the hay harvest is nearing completion by July 4 but this year it had hardly started then.

The only danger to the crops from now on is hail storms or hot winds. Of the two the hail could do more damage as the most that hot winds could do now would be to shrivel the wheat a little.

## Over Four Million Expected.

Though Hyman Cohen, market editor of the Journal who was here last week, estimates that the yield this year will be about 3,500,000 bushels of wheat, local grainmen declare he is off about a million bushels. The normal yield is close to 5,000,000 and one grainman declared it would not surprise him to see this mark reached.

It will be the light land sections that will make big yields this year. The so-called pride lands of the reservation and contiguous territory will probably fall a little short of normal but the light lands will more than overcome this deficiency. Wheat and barley about Pilot Rock, Nolin, Echo and as far north as Wallula are headed out better than for years and indicate bumper crops at this time. Inasmuch as the light lands, exceed the heavy lands in area by far, the increase in their yield will have a noticeable effect.

The quality of the wheat this year is also expected to be extremely good and much better than last year. There is some rumor reported from different sections but not enough to constitute a menace.

## Domestic Life in War Time

Eighteen months of participation in stupendous war has had a sobering effect on the belligerents, which is now being reflected in the domestic life of the peoples involved, if stories that come across the water are to be believed. Carelessness and indifference have given way to soberer and more seemly conduct, and a consequent improvement in personal habits and behavior has followed. From England comes the testimony of a school teacher that never were the children under her charge so well looked after as today! They come to school cleanly and tidy in appearance, and demean themselves with a decorum unknown before. This teacher holds that since the wives and mothers of England have actually become responsible for the management of the homes they are more earnest in the pursuit of those duties that fall to the lot of the housewife. From Germany similar reports are heard, and it may be taken that this is in some measure true of the domestic life in all countries. The presence of great national danger has turned the popular mind to the more serious contemplation of mundane things, and better ways of living naturally follow. It is not especially an occasion for pride that such a dreadful shaking up was needed to stir man to more worthy efforts, but it will be accepted as proof that his sordid condition was not hopeless.

## Mother and Child Burned to Death.

Hermiston, Ore., July 11.—Mrs. Peyton T. Boone, wife of a well known project farmer, and her two year old daughter, Grace, were fatally burned last evening in a fire at their home two miles from this town.

Mrs. Boone was cooking in the kitchen about 8:30 when something went wrong with the gasoline stove and it flared up. Fearing an explosion, Mrs. Boone carried it outside and the child followed her. The clothing of both caught fire from the flames and they were burned terribly before the flames were extinguished. The baby died last night and the mother this morning.

Mr. Boone and the other children were not at home at the time having gone for a walk. Only the woman who cooks for the family was present. The bodies will be shipped to Havre, Mont.
