### City Manager's Report.

La Grande, Oregon, July 12.—(To the Commission.)—Gentlemen:—The police arrested 14. Six were drunk; one was disorderly and the rest for traffic violations. Nineteen meals were served and \$85.50 fines were collected.

The water superintendent spent \$33.10 on routine repair work.

The street superintendent spent \$30.87 for teams and drivers and \$15 for White wing. He repaired a cross walk on Jefferson and Third, fixed a foot bridge on Palmer avenue; cleaned up, flushed and sprinkled streets.

There were no fires last week.

The recorder collected \$51.36 principal and \$12.39 interest on Sewer 3rd, Section No. one; \$85.50 fines; \$5.00 pound fees; 50 cents for one building permit and \$7.00 dog license. He issued dray licenses on \$25 treasurer's receipts; pop corn license on

\$25 treasurer's receipt. He issued \$1321.67 salary warrants and \$484.31 labor warrants; \$200 earnest payments on lots for street department and one for \$15 for bill allowed.

The treasurer received \$794.21 Imp. District Installments; \$262.70 Imp. District Interest; \$1137.95 water rent; \$25 dray licenses; \$25 pop corn license and \$2.85 interest District No. 99. He paid \$355.55 water warrants; \$203.87 road warrants; \$1385 Imp. District interest; \$47.95 general warrants with \$5.88 interest thereon. Purchased \$850.92 general warrants for the Beaver creek pipe line sinking fund, face value \$868.29.

### New Force of "Police Mothers" Guards Girls

New York, July 13.—There appeared upon the beach at Coney Island today the new force of "Police Mothers," a volunteer organization of women possessing police authority, whose members patrol the sands to keep harm from the thousands of girls who come alone to the big resort.

The force is commanded by Mrs. Ellen Craig, of the department of parks of the Borough of Brooklyn. While the Police Mothers cooperate with the regular police, their work is more personal and calculated to prevent trouble for the girls rather than to stop it after it has gotten started. The patrolled district is the entire beach, from Sea Gate to Brighton. The Police Mothers serve without pay.

### Hughes Will Open Campaign in West

Bridgehampton, N. Y., July 10.—Charles E. Hughes has decided to have the ceremony of his formal nomination for the presidency held in New York. It will take place on a Monday if possible, probably July 31, although perhaps a week earlier. The nominee prefers having it in a large hall.

Republican and Progressive leaders from every section of the country will be invited, if the tentative program is adopted, and hundreds of other invitations will be issued to party workers in New York. Mr. Hughes wishes to have the general public admitted if any seats are available.

Almost immediately after the notification of the campaign, will open with a four or five weeks' trip to the Pacific coast, broken by two weeks' vacation in the Rocky mountains. Returning, the nominee will open his Eastern campaign in Maine prior to

the state election early in September.

Not only will Mr. Hughes speak in Maine but it is likely both Colonel Roosevelt and former President Taft will be requested to take the stump there.
