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FALLING WALL KILLS OLD MAN

R. G. WINSTON VICTIM OF THE ACCIDENT

Joseph Citizen Struck By Falling Timbers

Joseph, June 13.—(Special)—Richard G. Winston, an old resident of Wallowa county, was killed yesterday afternoon when a portion of the old McCully store building was blown over on him. The building is being removed and Mr. Winston, who was 81 years of age, was looking on at the proceedings as a bystander. Mr. Winston came to Wallowa county in 1884 and was engaged in farming and stock raising until the time of his removal to Joseph. His family of several children are all grown. He had acquired a comfortable competence and for several years has been on the retired list.

National Employment Bureau for Women Ready

Washington, July 13.—Uncle Sam's all ready to help his women and girls get jobs. Organization of the recently created Women's & Girls' division of the United States Employment service of the Bureau of Immigration now is on a working basis. Commissioner-General of Immigration Caminetti announced here today.

Branches of this bureau have been established in all the leading cities of the country. They are in charge of women. Uncle Sam's investigation disclosed that women and girls don't like to deal with men when they go to an employment bureau, that's why. The service stations will give special attention to the requests of women wage earners for work and to meeting the demand for female help in rural as well as urban communities. If a woman in Des Moines wants a job in Kansas City but doesn't know much about conditions down there, she will be told by the bureau. Detailed information about pay, hours and general conditions will be placed at her disposal by the bureau.

If the woman wants to get into a certain kind of work but doesn't know enough about it to be efficient, the bureau nearest her home will provide her a vocation training course along that line and be hunting a job for her in the meantime.

Each bureau is responsible to the government for the sort of places it sends the women who ask for jobs. The women in charge of the bureaus must "protect the women and girls from exploitation and misdirection; and no woman or girl shall be directed an opportunity unless the character of the place and the employer has been established to the satisfaction of the officer in charge." The factory owners and business men of the United States are urged to cooperate with Uncle Sam's women agents in getting efficient female help placed in the right jobs.

Fall of Bagdad Predicted

London, July 12.—With British and Russian forces converging on Bagdad, military experts pointed out here today that the fall of the great Turkish stronghold probably will follow one of the most decisive battles of the war.

The reason is cotton. Far more important, say the experts, than the encircling of the Turco-German division in the middle reaches of the Tigris is the fact that for months since American cotton has been denied to Germany the Bagdad region has been the chief source of cotton for German arsenals. Cotton from this district, probably the last avenue to German open to this vital necessity for Teutonic explosives, has been steadily crawling over the Bag-

dad railway since the British blockade observed American cotton as contraband.

It is the opinion here that Germany will order the Turks to hold Bagdad at all costs and probably will send large numbers of men to aid the Sultan's fighters. The point is declared, from the German standpoint, to be one of the most vital of the war.

With the Tigris floods abated, an active and relentless Anglo-Ru campaign against ancient Bagdad is believed to have already commenced.
