Japanese Is Film Star. Sessue Hayakawa, the noted Japanese actor will be seen at the Arcade today and tomorrow only in the Jesse L. Lasky production of "Alien Souls," a thrilling photodrama written especially for him by Hector Turnbull, author of "The Cheat" in which play Hayakawa established himself as one of the most distinguished actors of the day. It is a Paramount attraction. For the past two years, after having starred with a number of motion picture companies, Mr. Hayakawa has been under contract with the Lasky organization and has appeared in the productions "The Clue," "The Secret Sin" and "The Cheat." His popularity has become so great that in response to public demands he will be starred at the head of a company of his own. Tennyson's "Maud" in Photoplay. Photoplay knows no limitations for inspiration—the printed book, the acted drama, the imaginative scenario—and now comes Lord Alfred Tennyson's beautiful love sonnet, "Maud," as the basis of a Bluebird Photoplay to be exhibited at the Sherry theatre today and tomorrow with Francelia Billington enacting the role of the poetical heroine. There are those who have read the Tennyson classic who have not been able to grasp the full meaning of the bard; to those who admit that they have been thus mystified, the photostory will lend a new charm to the poem. Those who have never read it would best now read it and then see the Bluebird portrayal of one of the richest classics in the language of any clime. The plot is localized in the South just before the war and during the Rebellion. The story is acted in practically two parts, the juvenile section comprising the first reel, with these some characters grown up to complete the sad and tragic narrative. Francelia Billington typifies to the keenest imagination an ideal heroine,

tall, stately and beautiful of face and form—and an actress capable of extracting the last atom of advantage from the opportunities she shares in telling the gripping tale. Rupert Julian, star member of the cast; Jack Holt and Douglas Gerrard impersonate the three male characters that entwine their lives of the stately and statuesque Maud; while Nannie Howard, Ben Harning and Paul Weigle are other principals.

STATE NEWS BREVITIES.

Portland Superintendent Ill. L. R. Alderman city superintendent of schools in Portland, who is attending the annual convention of the National association in New York City is reported ill there, although not seriously so.

Normal Attendance 806. There has been a yearly gain in attendance at Monmouth Normal school. This year's attendance is 806, a gain of three hundred over last year.

Post Given H. A. Hansen. H. A. Hansen, for many years assistant superintendent of the Union Pacific dining car service at Omaha, will succeed J. C. Morrison who has recently resigned as superintendent of the dining car and hotel department of the O. W. R. & N. C. company. His headquarters will be at Portland.

More Liquor Is Received. In all 349 shipments of beer were received in Baker county in June, a gain of nearly 5000 quarts over that of May.

John Day Road Assured. A road is being surveyed through Grant, Baker and Malheur counties which will connect the Columbia River highway with the Lincoln highway.

Cherry Stems Used in War. Wasco county cherry stems, from which cyanide of potassium is made, are being shipped to Europe to make the poisonous gas that is used by the armies there.

Cherry Picking Record. Twelve hundred pounds of cherries were picked by Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Thompson of The Dalles in eight hours. Two boys picked 1600 pounds in one day a few weeks ago.

Bandon Chautauqua Well Attended. Visitors from all parts of Coos and Curry counties are attending the Chautauqua which opened at Bandon this week.

Fishing Improves at Astoria. There has been a large improvement in the run of salmon at Astoria. Several have recently caught as high as 800 pounds to the boat.

Indians Plan Exhibit. The State fair officials is to place an entire building at the disposal of the Umatilla Indian reservation, who are planning an exhibit this year. There is expected to be much competition between the several tribes for honors to be bestowed for the most beautiful display.

Grangers and Farmers to Meet. Grangers and allied farmers' clubs near Ashland will hold an all day picnic at Central Point, July 22. Among the outside speakers will be C. C. Cate formerly of La Grande.

Farmers to Talk Bonds. The proposed county road issue will be considered by the Wasco County Farmers' Education and Co-operative union at an open meeting to be held in Dufur July 22.

Cattle Feed at Issue. The Superior court has declared the county not liable for the bills for feed bought last winter to be fed to starving cattle by E. R. Smith, humane officer at that time. He bought the feed on county account believing the county could collect from the owners for same. Now if anyone collects from the owners it must be Mr. Smith.

Steer Tips 4000 Pounds. Riley M. Horn of Malheur county has brought a steer to Ontario weighing 4000 pounds. It is an ordinary range steer but Mr. Horn expects it, on feed, to gain the necessary 200 pounds to break the world's record.

13 Enlist at The Dalles. The proposed company of National Guards that is being raised at The Dalles now numbers 13. Lieutenant Edward Lemison has charge of them.

Inspection Points Named. Huntington and Ontario are likely to be the inspection points for infantile paralysis on the east, while Ashland will probably be named on the west side of the Cascades.

Walla Walla Pastor Dead. Rev. E. M. Clingan, of the First Presbyterian church, of Walla Walla, died recently. He was one of the best known ministers of southeast Washington and was pastor of the largest church in Walla Walla.

Idaho Blamed for Liquor Shipments. Proceedings are contemplated to test in the supreme court whether an individual is entitled to 24 quarts of beer and two quarts of whiskey in a month, or only one of the two. Malheur county had 856 quarts of beer shipped in last month and 560 quarts of whiskey, much of which, it is asserted, Idaho is responsible for, but it is not the duty of Oregon officers to stop them if they comply with the Anderson law.
