# TELOCASET HAS SNAKES

SAGE HEN HUNTERS ENCOUNTER REPTILES.

Big Salmon Running in Catherine Creek but Fairly Safe Yet.

Varying results attended sage hen hunts Saturday and Sunday. Out of a half dozen auto loads tabulated, a fair average is struck as some got the limit while others got none. None went and came without excitement for rattle snakes are thick as fleas in the Telocaset country. This uniform appearance of rattlers in Oregon when snake bite is hard to get, is unexplained but a fact it seems. Interior Oregon reports plenty rattlers this year.

C. O. Ramsey was telling some companion hunters while in quest of sage hens near Telocaset, that he would like to see a real sure enough rattler some time and he had his wish fulfilled instantly thereafter. Some of the snakes killed by that party measured about 40 inches long.

Jack Harlan, a mechanic, found himself standing on something that felt like a garden hose. Wondering what business hose might have in the sage brush country he investigated more fully and found himself squarely on the center of a large rattler. Emulating a jackrabbit movement he saw once, he forthwith left that part of Telocaset while companions slew the reptile. But between acts of killing snakes many a fine hen was knocked down.

Salmon are running in Catherine creek. It was generally thought that the water is still too high for this sport, and it is really but yesterday one fine fellow was pulled out by an up-creek resident. Nate Zweifel had his gig in the neck of a monster but the current is so swift that he couldn't hold it. L. M. Hoyt and others were ready to harpoon the monster but he got away. Several minutes later Rol Baker saw the badly wounded fish headed up stream but it was gone for keeps. Catherine creek unquestionably has as many salmon in its waters this year as last, and at the rate the stream has been going down, it will be a nice time to go a week hence. The one caught yesterday measured about 32 inches. While salmon promise to be plentiful, trout are as scarce as hen's teeth there being about as many fishermen on Sundays as there are fish.

Trade Name Basis of \$100,000 Court Action

Levi Strauss & Co. Suing Salt Lake City Firm

A temporary injunction was granted yesterday against J. C. Penney & Co. of Salt Lake and A. F. Leimance, California agent of the Salt Lake firm, by Judge J. J. Van Nostrand, prohibiting them from using the trade name "Koveralls." Levi Strauss & Co. are the complainants.

Levi Strauss & Co. allege that it created the trade name in 1912, and has spent \$100,000 for advertising it.

In addition to a permanent injunction, the Levi Strauss Company also asks for \$100,000 damages, claiming that its advertising has been nullified by the alleged act of the Salt Lake manufacturers.
