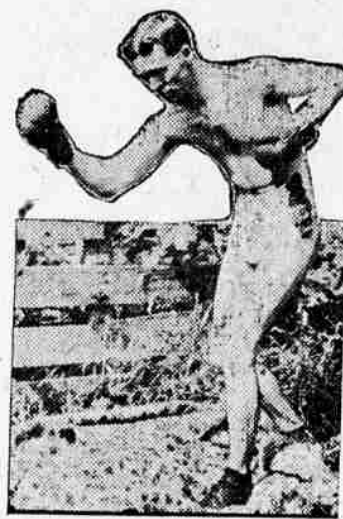
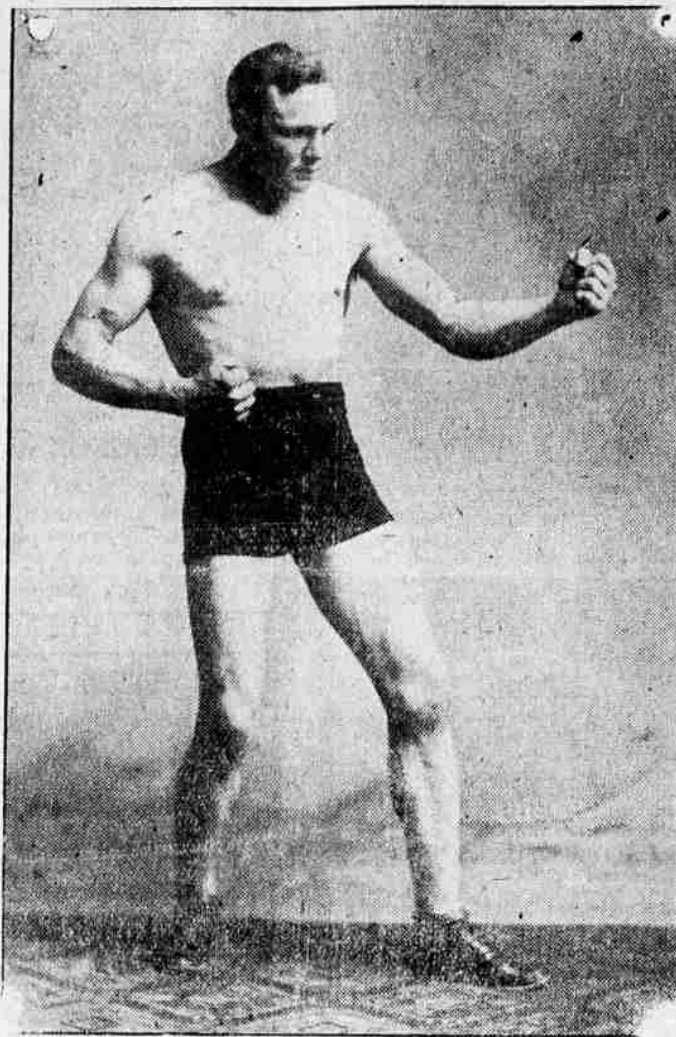

## ELGIN GAME NEAR THE LAST

IMBLER AND INDIANS PLAY NO MORE.

Cherry Fair Program Calls for Two Games This Week.

Imbler, July 17.—(Special)—The double header on the Elgin grounds Sunday finished the schedule between Elgin and Imbler. Only a small crowd turned out for the 10 o'clock game which was too one-sided to be of much interest. Imbler tried out a couple of extra pitchers as Bell was saving himself for the set-to with Darling in the afternoon. Shelton and Workman who have been playing in Wallawa county were Elgin's battery for the morning session and with fairly good assistance from their teammates, were able to pull down a decided victory with the score 13-2, although numerous errors were checked against both teams. At 2:30, with a good audience, Bell and Darling began their pitching battle and, notwithstanding the fact that a dust storm interfered during most of the game, baseball fans witnessed the best playing of the season in the Grande Ronde league. During the first five innings no batter was able to get acquainted with first base, either striking out or

hitting a fly or grounder that was handled by some fielder. During the remainder of the game a few men reached first but it was not until the ninth inning that Elgin made the long score of the game. Bell and Darling were both in exceptional form and each struck out 11 men and only two safe hits were obtained off each pitcher. Stringham and Workman caught both games. Outside of one muffed ball by each first baseman the entire game was errorless. Elgin fans say that Sunday afternoon's playing was the fastest ever pulled off on their ground.

The Elgin band was out and helped entertain the spectators who enjoyed the double blessing of the storm and no shelter, a fire having destroyed the grand stand last week.

Each team is scheduled to play Cove at the Cherry fair.
