CATTLE WEAK BUT HOGS HIGH

PORTLAND YARDS HAS UNBALANCED TRADE.

Supply of Sheep Nominal—Hogs Offered Liberally.

Portland, July 17.—With a very liberal showing of cattle supplies from Willamette valley and interior sections, the market for supplies opened rather slow at North Portland during the day. There was a small amount of business early with sales of steers as high as \$8.25 for a limited supply, but the general market was considered 15¢ to 25¢ lower than last week. Only a nominal supply of sheep made their appearance in the North Portland yards over Sunday. In fact, offerings were so limited that the market scarcely opened. In general the trend of the trade was considered steady around previous quotations.

It was a very strong market for hogs at North Portland for the week's opening. There was a fairly good run, but the demand was extremely keen and even at the start sales were made around \$9@9.05 or 20@25¢ higher than on Saturday. There was talk of \$9.10, but no sales had been confirmed early at this price.

The Amsherry boys have purchased another 40-acre piece adjoining their present farm. Considerable fencing is being done this summer. Mr. Amsherry has the contract of fencing the Ed Jasper ranch and Wm. Jasper is looking after his own fencing. It is reported that the road to Cricket Flat will soon be ready for travel. So far the new county bridge across the river has not been in general use. Work on the new O.-W. bridge across the Looking Glass at the Junction is proceeding nicely. Several nice catches of speckled beauties have been reported taken from Looking Glass the past week.

Mother Sues Son.

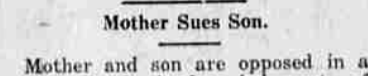

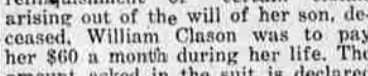

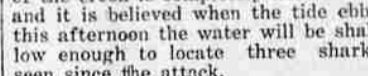
