OLD RAILROADER DEAD

listed from New York City, December 2, 1863, in the United States navy to serve one year, and was mustered into the service on that day as first-class fireman on board the U. S. Receiving Ship 'North Carolina,' later transferred to the U. S. 'Pensacola,' and soon afterward to the U. S. S. 'Ossipee,' Commander William E. Roy, on which he served during his term

of enlistment.

"The U. S. S. 'Ossipee' was first attached to the North Atlantic blockading squadron, under command of Rear Admiral Samuel P. Lee and performed patrol and blockade duty off the coast of the Carolinas. The limits of this squadron were Cape Henry, at Hampton Roads on the north, thence south along the coast to Virginia and South Carolina. Numerous inlets exist along this coast which were favorable for the passage of vessels engaged in contraband trade, the principal port used by the blockade runners being Wilmington, S. C. The 'Ossipee' was later transferred to the West Gulf Squadron, Rear Admiral David G. Farragut, commanding. The operations of this squadron were mostly confined to blockade duty with an occasional skirmish with the enemy. The duty in the gulf was harassing and at the same time tedious and monotonous. The 'Ossipee' participated in the battle of Mobile Bay, August 5, 1864, the fleet capturing Fort Morgan, Fort Gaines and the confederate ram, 'Tennessee,' and afterward occupying Mobile Bay. This squadron performed its share of the work

of putting down the rebellion by maintaining the blockade of the southern coast, the most severe duty performed by any officers during the war.

"The said Peter Floyd was transferred to the U. S. S. 'Hartford,' on which he sailed to the Brooklyn navy yard, N. Y., where he received an honorable discharge on the 16th day of December, 1864, by reason of expiration of his term of service.

"He was always to be found at his post of duty, and rendered faithful and meritorious service to his country.

"He is a son of John and Hannah (Duffy) Floyd and was born in Canada, on the 12th day of August, 1842. He was united in marriage to Mary A. Carroll, at Portland, Oregon, June 17, 1872, from which union were born seven children, only one son of whom is living, viz: Francis J. Floyd.

"After the death of his wife he married Kate A. Craig, at The Dalles, Ore., in 1897.

"Her father, Polhemus Craig, served as hospital steward in the war with Mexico.

"These facts are thus recorded and preserved for the benefit of all those who may be interested."
