### City Manager's Report.

La Grande, Oregon, July 19.—Manager's report for the week ending July 15th, 1916:

The fire department put out a fire in a clothes closet July 9th. This was probably caused by striking a match in searching for articles. Loss nominal except to clothes. Thirteen volunteers were out. July 11th, the roof on Ben Cotner's house burned. It caught from a flue. The damage to the house would be several hundred and the furniture and fixtures were damaged considerably by water. Thirteen volunteers were out. July 16th the run-way from the old Grande Ronde Cash Co.'s warehouse to rear of lot was burned. The coal shed adjoining was pretty well burned up except the floor. The fire started among the crates and rubbish on the ground.

The water department's expenses were \$34.50 for the week as follows: Repair work on meter system cost \$14.40; shut off work \$5.75; lowering sewer \$5.75; repairing leak at Green-

wood \$5.75 and 2 1-2 inch tap on Jefferson \$2.85.

The street department worked one team at \$28.50; a white wing at \$15 and purchased \$18.55 worth of cross walk lumber. Six cross walks were repaired during the week.

The police arrested five and collected \$50.00 fines and forfeitures.

The recorder received \$50.00 fines and forfeitures; \$13.26 principal and \$16.74 interest on District No. 24; \$15 dog licenses and 50 cents for one building permit. He issued bowling alley license on \$35 receipt. He issued a warrant on the Park fund for \$50 on voucher No. 69. He issued Library warrant for \$47.05 on vouchers No. 372 to 374. He drew warrants for \$1027.78 for bills allowed and \$30.35 for Labor certificates allowed.

The treasurer collected \$648.50 water rent; \$170.06 Imp. District Installments; \$268.03 Imp. District Interest; \$4.75 Interest District No. 99 and \$35 bowling license. He paid \$134.40 water warrants; \$269.75 Road warrants \$50 Park warrant; \$47.05 Library warrant; \$15 Contingent warrants; \$1066.05 Imp. ### 3 JAIL SELVES TWO YEARS

#### Mother and Two Daughters Are Voluntary Prisoners

New York, May 27.—For two years Mrs. Emma Hall, 42 years old, and her daughters, Florence, 22, and Frances, 20, have undergone a self-imposed imprisonment of the second floor of a three story brown-stone house at No. 166 Stuyvesant avenue Brooklyn. In that time they had never been outside, nor had they seen a ray of sunshine. Under amazing and terrible conditions they have merely existed. None in all the humming life about them have been interested enough to help.

The peculiar case was revealed to the officers of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. After an hour of coaxing and pleading the investigators made their way beyond the door of the mystery flat. They were astounded at the sight that met their eyes.

Since the day they moved into the flat two years ago not one of the three women has slept in bed. The two girls have slept in two straight back chairs the only chairs there. The mother has had neither chair nor bed. The only place where she could rest was on the floor.

Food was brought by Adam Hall, husband of the mother. Several times a week he came to the door of the apartment and found a note on the sill. This contained a list of supplies. He would buy and leave the food outside the door. For the last two years, he said, his wife had not admitted him within his home.

When the officers entered the strange family was at supper. The meal consisted of four plain bakery cakes, the whites of eggs, raw tapioca and vanilla extract. The girls were unable to rise from their chairs and fell to the floor. All three had to be carried to an ambulance.

They were removed to Kings County Hospital where they are being held for observation. It is said that the mother is demented from grief over the death of her first husband.

### New Coins To Be Minted.

Washington, May 30.—Dimes, quarters and half-dollars of new design will be minted after July 1. Secretary McAdoo announced today. For the first time since 1891 a change will be effected in these pieces. The announcement disclosed that the half-dollar had practically gone into disuse. The new design was selected by

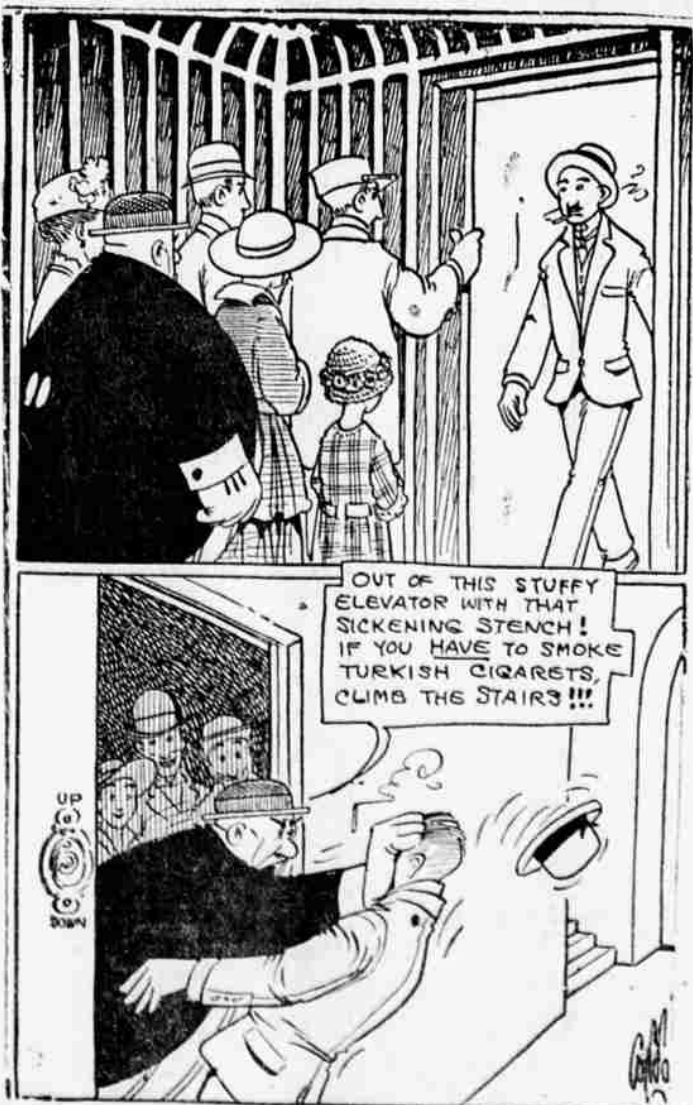
ing it to more general use, it was indicated. Under the new coinage, each piece will be of different design.

The half-dollar and dime models were made by Adolph A. Weinman, and the quarter-dollar by Herman A. MacNeil. Both are sculptors of note.

The face of the new half-dollar bears a full length of Liberty, with a background of the American flag flying to the breeze. The Goddess is striding forward to the dawn of a new day carrying laurel and oak branches, symbolic of civil and military glory. The reverse side shows an eagle perched high on a mountain crag, wings unfolded. Growing from a rift in the rock is a young sapling of mountain pine, symbolic of America.

Liberty, a full length figure is shown stepping toward the country's gateway bearing upraised a shield from which the covering is being drawn. The right hand bears an olive branch of peace. Above the head is the word, "Liberty," and below the feet "1916". The reverse bears a figure of an eagle in full flight, wings extended, and the inscriptions "United States of America" and "E Pluribus Unum." The design of the dime is simple. Liberty, with a winged cap is shown on the fore side and on the reverse is a design of a bundle of rods and a battle-ax symbolic of unity, wherein lies the nation's strength.
