NEW CITY PROPERTY TO BE UTILIZED SOON.

Miniature Flag Will Continue to Do Duty at Flag Staff.

Deeds to lots 14, 15 and 16, block 12, Grandy's second supplemental addition to La Grande, which is in the vicinity of extreme west Adams, have been officially put on record and are now property of the city for tool houses and pound purposes. The present pound will be abandoned August 1st and the new property made use of for that purpose. This was the action decided on last evening at the regular meeting of the City commission. The new property is partly on the side hill.
