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RARE RELICS ON DISPLAY

CANADIAN INTERPRETER HAS
HISTORICAL SUIT.

Che-che-pe-to-i-goi Explains History
of Indian Relics.

There is now on display in the windows of the United Store a suit of Moose skin clothes, like the many suits worn by our frontier men in the winning of the west. This suit was got by a gentleman now a resident of La Grande, who was known to the Cree Indians of the Canadian northwest as Che-che-pe-to-i-goi (the man who moves his hair.) This gentleman not only talked the Cree jargon but the Siwash and three or four other jargons which he used while inter-

preter among the Canadian Indians. The particular suit in question was made from a single moose hide. The head, after it was severed from the shoulders of this monster had to be cut in half so that it might be transported 16 miles through the woods. The horns measure 73 inches from tip to tip, had 35 points on each side, had two shovels, each of which would easily hold a quart of water, and three beards.

The story of how Che-che-pe-to-i-goi killed this moose, reputed to be the second largest ever slain in the northwoods, will be told in some future Observer article.

The beadwork on the suit is extra good especially on the waistcoat. At the Hudson Bay stores in Winnipeg this suit was valued at \$80.

There is also on display an old Colt revolver, number 105, which carries on its barrel the address "Samuel Colt, New York City." With this gun a Cree Indian named Wandering Spirit, did murder two Catholic priests by name of Father Marchant and Father Garfand in the Catholic church at Frog Lake, Saskatchewan, in the early spring of 1885, and before the Indian died confessed to Che-che-pe-to-i-goi that he had, many, many moons gone by, got it from a Sioux Indian down near the Sweet Grass hills. He, the Sioux, had told him that he was with Sitting Bull down on the Big Horn where they had killed lots of American soldiers and that he had pulled it off a dead soldier. In the fall of 1885 Wandering Spirit with 10 other Indians, was hung at Battleford for murdering Whites. A touching incident reflective of human nature within the redskin's heart, developed in the transaction that put the revolver in Che-che-pe-to-i-goi's hands, but this will be told in subsequent interviews with the interpreter concerning his long experience with Canadian Indians.

Ignorance of Law Unavailing.

Eugene Hawley, a shingle weaver, is in jail at Chehalis charged with setting fire to the Harm & Brown mill. Hawley had been discharged from the mill following a drunken spree.

Intervened in Prisoner's Behalf.

Arnold McLay, held in jail at Marshfield on charge of criminal intimacy with a young girl, has been released under \$1000 bonds. A widow, Mrs. Philbrick, of California, from where McLay was returned, intervened in his behalf.

Learn Latin in a Week.

Betty Schafer, aged 13, and Jane Campbell, aged 14, translated at the University of Oregon a 200-word composition into Latin after only seven days' instruction. Dr. Berle, of Cambridge, Mass., was their instructor and it was done to demonstrate a method of teaching by which the co-ordination of words and their meaning are the first essentials. A statistician has gathered together some interesting data which show the magnitude of the automobile business. He took as a basis the Willys-Overland capacity of 1,000 cars per day and then figured out the average length of the various models, approximately 14 1/2 feet.

The factory's output for a single

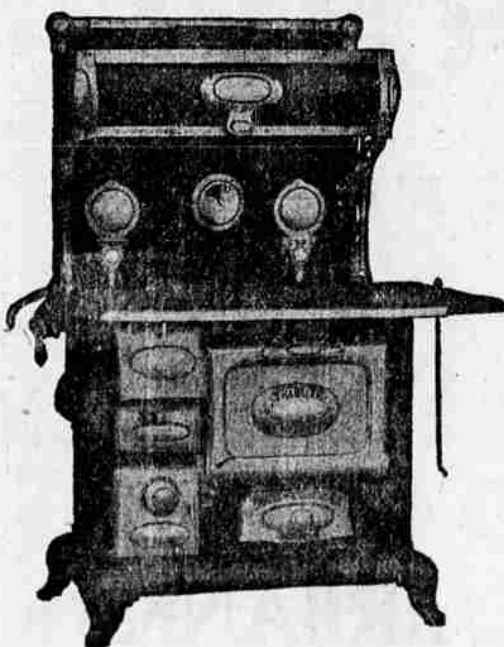
day would extend in a straight line for a distance of about 23-4 miles, if the cars were placed end to end and touching each other.

In a year's time this stream of cars would be 860 miles long—an unbroken line of automobiles from Toledo to New York and then back again as far as Albany.

Even more startling were the fig-

ures compiled showing the value of the Overland factory's output. The enormous manufacturing facilities of the plant enables it to ship out finished cars valued at approximately \$900,000 every twenty-four hours. In a year's time at the rate of 1,000 cars per day, these shipments would represent over \$200,000,000.
