### Women Drunkards More Persistent Than Men

Denver, Colo., July 26.—Drunkenness among women has been slower to decrease under the state prohibition law than among men, juvenile court authorities said here today.

Prohibition has cut down the number of cases before the various city courts, 75 per cent. Habitual men drunkards have almost disappeared. While drinking by women shows a marked decrease the percentage of habitual "woman drunks" who have reformed falls much below that of the men.

Juvenile court officer John Phillips, who meets these cases because children generally suffer when their parents get drunk, said women become liquor victims through environment, despondency and out of revenge.

"Once a woman is cursed with this habit," said Phillips, "her downfall is much faster than a man's because of her frail physical makeup. Women addicted to both the liquor and tobacco habits, it is almost impossible to cure."

### Objections Many to Adjudication.

Baker, July 25.—The largest list of objections and exceptions to be filed to the Powder River Water adjudication, was entered this morning by the land owners of Lower Powder, 38 in all, headed by Margaret E. Blackburn. The chief contentions are that their use of water was previously secured by vested rights, and that to reduce the amount found necessary by past experience, would be unconstitutional. The contention is also made that water should be measured at the point at which it is taken from the ditch to be used on the land, instead of at the point where it enters the ditch from the stream.

Two other objections to the adjudication were filed this morning, one by George Barr and Ebenezer Burr, in regard to the use of the waters of Pine creek, and one by Wm. A. Jackson, concerning the irrigation of land in Baker.

All of the 28 counties of Utah contain portions of National Forests and consequently all share in the 25 per cent of the National Forest receipts which is paid over to the road and school funds. This is true of no other state.

### City Manager's Report.

General manager's report for the week ending July 22, 1916:

The fire department was called to Mrs. Anna James' house July 20th. Twelve volunteers were out and 800 feet of hose was laid. As the inside and roof were ablaze before the alarm was turned in the loss is heavy. The loss was adjusted at \$1015 on the house and \$604 on the contents.

The water department spent \$34.50 during the week as follows: lowering pipe, \$20.10; patching pavement, \$5.75; repairing old meters \$5.75; reading meters \$2.90.

The street superintendent spent \$28.50 for team and driver; \$15 for white wing; \$5.75 for cross walk lumber and had two days work done by prisoner. They repaired a bridge over irrigation ditch at Z and Green wood; leveled the street at cross walk at M and Seventh street to cut down a bad bump, cleaned and flushed the streets and placed seats on Adams. Overlooked sprinkling East Adams for the races. All the macadam streets need sprinkling once or twice a week during dry weather.

The police arrested 12; seven of whom were drunk. They served 24 meals and collected \$60 fines. Three men and two women are serving time for drunk or disorderly.

The recorder received \$60 fines; \$30.63 principal and \$1.55 interest

District No. 8—an old lien about to be foreclosed; \$4 dog license and \$1 for two building permits. He issued a warrant for \$450 on the Road fund for balance of purchase price of \$650 on the lots for the street department. He issued Park warrants or \$83.65 and \$15.10 on vouchers No. 70 and 71. He issued a dance license on treasurer's receipt for \$5 and a taxi license on \$5 receipt.

The treasurer collected \$425.70 water rent; \$360.23 Imp. District Installments; \$179 Imp. District Interest; \$3 interest District No. 99; \$5 for dance hall license and \$5 for taxi license. He paid \$1.25 Road warrant; \$98.75 Park warrants; \$435 Imp. District Interest and \$1225 semi-annual interest on \$49,000 water bonds.
