Aged Plaintiff Loses Suit.
The suit filed by B. F. Finn, aged 93, of the McKenzie river region, for the cancellation of a deed to the old Finn place of 40 acres because of alleged fraud, has been decided against the plaintiff. The tract of land involved is valuable. Finn claims to have been the original "Huckleberry" Finn, Mark Twain's famous character.

OUTLINE OF FARM LOAN

The act provides for the creation of 12 Federal land banks and permits the establishment of any number of joint-stock land banks for the purpose of making loans at a reasonable rate of interest, for long periods of time, on farm lands.

A Federal Farm Loan Board has complete control over these banks.

(A) Federal Land Banks
Twelve federal land banks are provided, one in each of 12 districts into which the country will be divided. These banks are empowered to lend on first mortgages on farm lands in amounts of \$100 to \$10,000 for approved purposes. The loans are to be made through farm loan associations and agents. No loan may be made for more than 50 per cent of the value of the land mortgaged and 20 per cent of the value of the permanent improvements upon it.

National farm loan associations—local organizations composed exclusively of borrowers—are authorized. These associations must be stockholders in the land banks in proportion to the amount their members wish to borrow. Eventually all stock in the federal land banks will be owned exclusively by these associations.

A reasonable interest rate is established. The act prohibits the federal land bank from charging more than six per cent on any mortgage, or requiring fees not approved by the farm land board.

The borrowers will share in the net profits of the bank because they are stockholders. It is contemplated that ultimately the borrowers will be the only stockholders.

Long term loans are provided by authorizing mortgages for periods of from five up to 40 years.

Small annual or semi-annual payments on the principal are made a required feature of all mortgages.

(B) Joint-Stock Land Banks
Joint-stock land banks are authorized. They are corporations for carrying on the business of lending on farm mortgage security and issuing farm loan bonds. They are to be under the supervision of the Farm Land Board but the government will not invest in them. Subject to geographical limitations and subject to the 50 and 20 per cent limitation these banks can lend to an individual any amount they wish, and for any purpose. They can not charge an interest rate exceeding six per cent, and such rate must not exceed by more than one per cent the interest they have paid on their last issue of bonds. Their mortgages, however, must provide for amortization payments. These banks are prohibited from charging, under any pretext, fees or commissions other than those authorized by the act.

First Frenchman Shot in War.
Paris, August 2.—France paused today in tribute to the memory of Corporal Jules-Andre Peugeot, the first Frenchman killed in the present war. It was at Joncherey on the Upper Rhine, at 10 o'clock a. m., August 2, 1914, about 24 hours before the war actually was declared between Germany and France, that Peugeot was shot to death by Lieutenant Mayer, at the head of a German patrol squad. A national subscription is today being collected under the patronage of the Minister of War and the Minister of Public Instruction for the erection of a monument to Corporal Jules-Andre Peugeot on the spot where he fell. It is proposed that the name and heroic acts of Peugeot pass down in history as have those of Marechal des Logis Pagniez, the first victim of the

war of 1870, who was killed at Niederbronn. Peugeot 21, was a corporal in the sixth company of the 44th regiment of infantry. Early in August he was stationed at Joncherey, two kilometers from Delle and 12 kilometers from the German frontier. On the morning of August 2, he had just finished placing a sentinel and returned to the house of A. M. Dancourt, when the latter's little daughter came running in crying. "The Prussians! The Prussians!" Rushing outside, Corporal Peugeot found himself facing a mounted German patrol of seven members under command of Lieutenant Mayer of the Fifth Regiment of Chasseurs stationed at Mulhouse. Peugeot gave the order to halt, to which Mayer replied by drawing his revolver and firing three shots into the body of the corporal. The latter fell to his knees, discharging his gun before he could take aim. By this time a few of Peugeot's men had rushed up, one of whom, named Monnier, killed Lieutenant Mayer with two shots from his rifle. In the fight that followed, participated in by some French dragoons who had come up at the sound of the firing, all of the Germans were killed with the exception of one who escaped. Peugeot was the only French soldier killed in the fray. He has since been cited to the order of the day for his bravery.

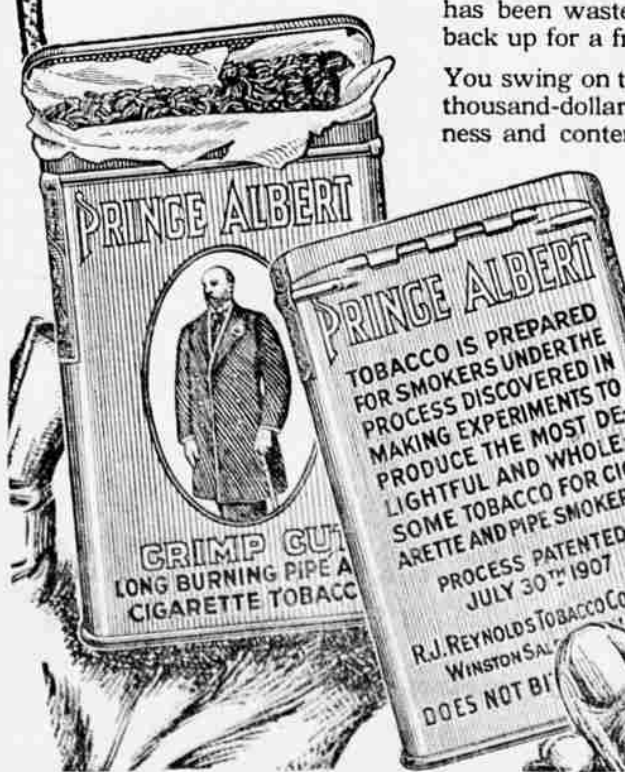
