**BIG MOMENT FOR BESSIE BARRISCALE**

Confronted With a Double Sin, She is Forced to Wreck Her Own Heart

On the verge of invading another woman's home because of her love for that woman's husband, Ethel Duprey finds that the wife she is about to wrong has befriended her in her hour of greatest need.

Here is a situation to try the emotional powers of any actress. Bessie Barriscale has the role, in the Triangle-Kay Bee picture, "The Last Act," which will be seen at the Arcade theater tonight only, and her performance does full justice to the unique situation the playwright has conceived.

As an actress out of work and out of money, Miss Barriscale is seen in the earlier moments of the play, considering her hopeless situation while seated on a park bench. A big-hearted woman, passing, notices her and stops to ask if she can be of any assistance. The girl is too proud to accept help, but the woman nevertheless slips a bill into her purse, unobserved.

"Battle of Hearts"—Brief Summary. "Battle of Hearts," starring the talented actor William Farnum, is the first filmed story of sea life presented by William Fox, the maker of vital feature films. In this picture, just released, Mr. Farnum acts the part of a noble sailor character, brave and capable of great self-sacrifice. He is in love with a sea captain's daughter, a part taken by Elda Furry, his new leading woman, but through the plots of the villain of the story the girl does not realize the capacity of his love until the end of the play.

**VICTIMS OF BLAST.**

**Survivor Tells Some Particulars of the Tragedy.**

Portland, Aug. 1.—J. W. Akin, sole survivor of the accident that took the lives of six men at the Columbia county rock crusher, six miles from St. Helens yesterday morning, was in Portland today and told the story of the accident.

"I was at the mouth of the tunnel in which seven cans of black powder had been loaded in a 'T,' he said, 'just a few minutes before the accident.'

Henry Lewis, who was in the tunnel with Voss, Winchell and Hammer, asked me if I would not take the cover off a can of powder that sat 20 feet from the mouth of the tunnel. I started to do as he requested and had just bent over the can when the explosion took place. Fine dirt and rock were thrown all over my back and legs and the ground shook so much that it was almost impossible for me to stand.

"I turned and saw stones and dirt pouring out of the mouth of the tunnel with as great velocity as if shot from a cannon. When the dust cleared away I went to the mouth of the tunnel. Lewis had been near the edge of the opening, and Keelan was directly at the mouth when I saw them last before the explosion. They were nowhere to be seen. The rock in the tunnel had been caved in and I could not see any traces of the men, who I knew had died inside, except a few bits of flesh and scraps of torn clothing.

"As soon as I could steady my nerves I found a telephone and called for help from St. Helens.

Body Blown Quarter Mile. "Keelan's body was torn in two and found almost a quarter of a mile from the mouth of the tunnel. Young Lewis' body was found torn to pieces 150 feet from the opening. The other men who were inside the 24-foot depth when the explosion occurred could not be found except in small pieces, and this morning not all of the pieces had been recovered and perhaps never will be.

"My idea of the accident is thus: Lewis had sent for several sticks of explosive with which to set off the black powder. Keelan had just handed them to him a few seconds before I heard the explosion. The other men inside were standing around and Lewis had a flashlight, with which the powder charges are exploded, in his hand. When Keelan handed in the 'exploders' I believe Lewis accidentally made a connection with the flashlight and set off the charge.

"Lewis was a powder man of many years of experience and knew enough about the handling of powder never to use other than the greatest care. "Statements have been made that my clothing was torn to threads by the explosion. This is untrue. My coat was on the ground at one side of the tunnel and was torn to bits, but I was unhurt."

All night long Akin worked to recover the bodies of the dead men and had no sleep when he came to Portland this morning. He was able to get but one man who would venture into the dangerous tunnel following the accident and the two men did all of the work removing the broken rock alone.

Many Widows and Children. Henry Lewis leaves a family of a wife and four children. Winchell, who has been employed on the tunnel but a short time, also leaves a widow and four children. Hammer was married a year ago and is survived by a widow and infant child. Voss is survived by parents in Warren, Or. Keelan was the son of Mrs. Thomas Keelan, of Portland.

The list of dead follows: Henry Lewis, aged 40, of St. Helens, and his son, Le Roy, aged 17; Joseph Keelan, aged 19, 241 Cook street, Portland; George Hammer, aged 31, St. Helens; Herman Voss, aged 20, War-

ren; C. E. Winchell, aged 35, St. Helens.
