Marion County Owes Pension.

Salem, Or., Aug. 1.—Under the 1913 mothers' pension law a mother does not forfeit her right to a pension by working away from her family residence, the supreme court ruled today, in the case of Mary Lulela Finley, appellant, versus the Marion county court.

The plaintiff filed an application for a pension in July, 1913, alleging that her husband was incapable of supporting her, and that she had a son 8 years old. After delaying action on the application until July, 1915, the county court denied it, giving as one reason that the plaintiff was employed at work which kept her away from her home. Circuit Judge Galloway held that she was entitled to a pension, but that she had been guilty of laches in not compelling the county court to act on her application, and that she should only draw benefits from July, 1915.

"We are of the opinion that under the act of 1913 the mother was not required to be with her family all the time if she kept them together in a home, and that she did not forfeit her right to a pension by working away from the family residence at some hours of the day if such labor were necessary to contribute to their subsistence," said the court in part.

The court also held that the plaintiff is entitled to the pension from the time of her application, and that the county court was not empowered to and other relief than that provided by law. County Judge Bushey declined to grant a number of pensions under the act and the decision today affects them all.
