**PETITION WITHDRAWN**

**Pendleton Will Not Ask for Port of Umatilla.**

Pendleton, Aug. 3.—The petition which was filed with the County court a couple of weeks ago asking for a vote this fall on the creation of a port district in the country tributary to the town of Umatilla, was withdrawn this afternoon by James A. Fee, attorney for the petitioners.

The remonstrators appeared this morning with a counter petition largely signed by the residents and land holders in the proposed district and it was decided to let the matter rest for a time. The remonstrance argued that the law providing for the creation of a port district contemplated only a port with access from the sea and not a municipality to be created for the purpose of building a railroad, Raley & Raley appeared for the remonstrators.

There were 590 names on the remonstrance. Of these, 484 were legal voters, 160 were not voters but were landholders in the proposed district. There are 442 registered voters in the district and the names of 255 of these were on the remonstrance.

On the petition there were 60 names. Of these 13 were not registered voters. On the remonstrance appeared 26 of the names which were signed to the petition, leaving 21 registered voters on the petition as against 255 on the remonstrance.
