New Echo District Proposed

Echo, Or., Aug. 2.—Seven thousand acres of the rich bottom land of Butter creek will constitute a new irrigation district if the petition to be presented to the Umatilla county court at the next session is allowed. The proposed district includes practically all of the Butter creek land now under cultivation, and is being formed for the purpose of contracting with the Teel Irrigation district for the purchase of stored water for use in the late summer.

Near Lehman Springs a reservoir with a capacity of 35,000 acre feet is to be built as a part of the Teel district system. This will supply about 12,000 acre feet of water more than will be used on Teel lands, and it is from this surplus that the proposed Butter creek district is to be supplied.

Most of the land in the new district is now in alfalfa, and produces good crops, but water is needed during the hot mid-summer season to

"Don Quixote" Rescues Maidens in Distress.

"Don Quixote," an adaptation of Cervantes' famous novel, will be shown by the Fine Arts-Triangle company at the Arcade theatre Sunday only. It is an interesting, dramatic and thoroughly amusing picture of life in the sixteenth century, in Spain.

Don Quixote, (De Wolf Hopper) has become crazed by much reading on the subject of knight-errantry. He dons armor, arms himself with sword and spear and rides away with his faithful servant Sancho Panzo, (Max Davidson) in search of adventures. The Don is mounted on an old white horse, yclept Rosinante, his squire bestrides a mule.

At an inn the knight meets Dulcinea (Fay Tincher) an humble "slavey," and picks her as the lady for whom he will fight. A muleteer, jealous of Don Quixote's attentions to the girl, is thrown downstairs when he interferes. There is a grand mix up in the night, when Dulcinea strays into the knight's room. The muleteer and the landlord belabor the knight, and Sancho also gets into the melee.

As a result the Don and his squire are locked up in the stable for the rest of the night. In the morning, the forgetful knight rides off without settling the score and Sancho is tossed in a blanket as a penalty.

Don Quixote sees some windmills and mistakes them for giants. He attacks them with his lance and is overthrown. Seizing a wing he is revolved through the air and thrown full mishap, the knight continues on his way. He meets a barber on the bank of a river, vanquishes him, and takes his basin away from him, thinking it is a helmet belonging to a king. With the basin on his head he rides off.

Next the crazed knight attacks a body of guards and convicts on their way to a galley ship, mistaking them for a band of robbers. Cardenio (George Walsh), who is one of the convicts, excites the pity of the Don, who listens to his troubles. He rescues the sweetheart of Cardenio, just as she is being compelled to marry Don Fernando (Chestor Withey) after which he finds Cardenio, as he is going to kill himself and restores him to his lady love, Lucinda (Rhea Mitchell).

The Don also succors Dorothea (Julia Faye), who has been deceived by Don Fernando, and has run away from home. She is herding sheep and undergoing brutality at the hands of her employer, when the knight and Cardenio come to her assistance. There is some hot fighting between a band of cavaliers, led by Don Fernando and Don Quixote and his followers. Fernando is wounded and is taken to the inn at the appeal of Dorothea, who relents when she sees her former lover in agony.

Quixote is shot and afterwards carried to the inn, where he is placed in the basement stable. His faithful Sancho and Dulcinea, his lady love, find he is fatally wounded. He re-

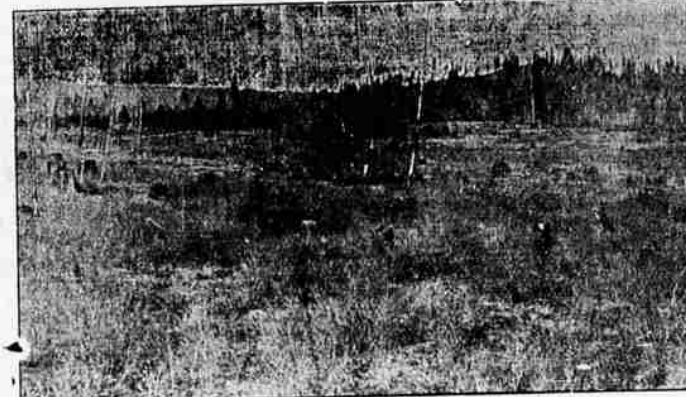
