Committee Is Named.

Washington, Aug. 3.—The special joint committee of the Senate and House, appointed under the Newlands act to investigate railroad conditions, has been named, and will begin its work probably at the adjournment of the session. It will report to the next congress. The members of the committee are:

Senators Francis G. Newlands, Republican, Nevada; Joseph T. Robinson, Democrat, Arkansas; Oscar W. Underwood, Democrat, Alabama; Albert B. Cummins, Republican, Iowa; Frank B. Brandegee, Republican, Connecticut; Representatives William C. Adamson, Democrat, Georgia; Wm. A. Cullop, Democrat, Indiana; Thetus W. Sims, Democrat, Tennessee; John J. Esch, Republican, Wisconsin; Edward L. Hamilton, Republican, Michigan.

The Senators are the members of the Senate Interstate Commerce committee, the Representatives of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee.

The inquiry originally was suggested by President Wilson in his message to Congress on Dec. 7, 1915, to cover "railroad regulation and legislation." As it is formulated in the Newlands act, the inquiry will include Government control and regulation of interstate and foreign transportation, changes in the Interstate
