EARL J. CLARK WANTS PARDON

How efforts are afoot to bring pardon to Earl J. Clark, now in the Salem prison for a check offense committed here, is told in the following Portland dispatch:

Back behind the bars of the Oregon penitentiary today is Earl J. Clark. He was brought from Spokane, Wash., yesterday, to finish an indeterminate sentence of from one to five years, which he interrupted when he broke out of prison in February, 1913.

In the three years and six months since he escaped Clark has been living a model life it is claimed. He has worked to support his young wife and his baby daughter, born while he was in prison.

The day after the Spokane police took him from his bed in his apartment in Spokane, Mrs. Clark confessed that she committed the crime for which her husband, to shield her, went to prison. The story was told to the people of Spokane, and they believed it, and gave Clark their support in his fight against extradition.

To fight for his freedom, Clark lost the fight. His only hope now is for executive clemency. People of Portland have begun a movement to get the man out of prison so he can continue to live with his family the life he has lived for three years and six months. An effort will be made to secure a pardon or a parole for Clark.

As the prisoner of Joseph F. Keller, state parole officer, Clark was in the county jail for an hour yesterday. Here is the story of his escape from the penitentiary, as he told it in Portland:

"I am 27 years old; my wife is 23. We were spending a honeymoon in New Mexico in the fall of 1912 when Mrs. Clark wanted to come back West to be near her mother.

"When we got to La Grande my money ran out. Mrs. Clark, without my knowledge, passed some bad checks. She took them to stores and made small purchases. With the change we had enough money to get to Seattle. She told me what she had done, and a sheriff was on our trail. I spent 30 days in Seattle, and then they took me back to La Grande."

Advised to Plead Guilty. The sheriff knew Clark wasn't guilty, he says. He told the arrested man the best way out would be to plead guilty. He promised a parole from the bench. So Clark pleaded guilty.

"One to five years," the judge said. Clark was taken to the penitentiary the same day. He was a painter and plasterer; he had been earning \$6 a day. In the prison they paid him 50 cents a week. When he had been there three months a baby was born. His wife wrote to him and said she needed that 50 cents, so he decided to try to escape.

From a spoon handle he made a key to fit a window. He opened the window in broad daylight and got away. He was not missed until that night. The guards started after him and finally located him. They fired several shots at Clark and missed.

At Canby Clark swam the river and the guards were waiting for him on the other side. They fired again. Clark fled through the woods, hiding in a tree. As the guards came up and fired at the tree he ran again. This time he hid under a barn and the guards surrounded it. A dog came up by the side of the barn, saw the man in hiding and ran, barking, toward one of the guards. While they were chasing the dog Clark escaped.

Swims Columbia in February. Clark worked his way to the bank of the Columbia river, just below Portland. He used to be in the navy and he is a good swimmer. He swam across the Columbia in February. He threw away his prison clothes and was picked up naked on the Washington shore.

"There I met my first friend," Clark said today. "He was a farmer. He thought I was a lumberjack who had fallen from some boat. He took me to his house, stitched a cut in my head and fed and clothed me. I stayed with him four days and then the chase began to grow hot. The sheriff in Vancouver was looking for me."

"I told the farmer who I was and advised him to tell the sheriff. I promised to stay until he got in sight and then run. But the farmer would not tell; instead he gave me \$15 and told me to go. He was very hard up. He gave me all he had. Later I sent back the \$15 and a big bucket of candy for the children."

The Mother-in-Law. After a time Clark got in touch with his wife and she and the baby came to Spokane. Mrs. Clark's mother knew where they were and insisted on being paid for her silence, Clark says.

The Clarks went to Florida after 18 months in Washington. Clark had saved \$900. He found nothing to do in Florida, so he came back to Spokane, where they have been living nearly two years. Clark was a member of the painters' union.

"If I have to, I'll serve the time out and I can go wherever I want to, without having this over my head," Clark said this morning.

The money Mrs. Clark got from La Grande merchants has been refunded. None of them wants to prosecute.

Postoffice Structure Ready.

Pendleton, Aug. 8.—Pendleton's beautiful new federal building will be ready for occupancy between September 1 and 15 and Postmaster T. J. Tweedy this morning received formal notice from the postoffice department to move the local postoffice into the new buildings at the earliest practicable date.

Postmaster Tweedy expects to move early in the month, probably on the second Sunday, but suggests that be-

fore the new building is occupied that the Commercial association hold a formal opening so that the public may inspect it. He suggests Labor day as a favorable opening day and will take the matter up with the Commercial association.

The letter received by the local postmaster this morning was from Acting First Assistant Postmaster General F. E. Frazier. It stated that the department had been notified of the nearness of the completion of the building and gave Mr. Tweedy authority to move his office as soon as possible and to terminate the lease on the present quarters in the Hotel Pendleton block. He is also authorized to advertise for bids for moving the office.

It is expected that the present postoffice quarters will be utilized by the Hotel Pendleton. The management has been considering a plan of throwing the big room into a dining room. W. W. Cryder, supervisor of the Umatilla forest, will move his offices into the federal building about the same time the postal people move in.

In consummation of her plan Miss Cowan has succeeded in getting the required number of guarantors to make the undertaking a financial success, the prime requirements being the sale of 500 season tickets. It is not thought that this task will be a particularly difficult one, inasmuch as Wallowa lake is the county's playground and that the chautauqua will attract high-minded people here from all accessible points.

President I. Ross Leslie, of the commercial club, and others assisted Miss Cowan in effecting the preliminary steps and throughout the next twelve-month period, local sponsors are going to exert themselves to the utmost to the end that the chautauqua will be the complete success justified by local conditions. With the meet a regular thing for this part of the county, added numbers of folks in search of vacation pastime will undoubtedly be attracted to the lake.

Pendleton Is Opposed.

The people of Athena and vicinity, are strongly opposing the proposed bill for a normal school at Pendleton. They think that when the taxpayers of the state deem it advisable to re-establish a normal school in Eastern Oregon, it should be at Weston where the old state school has never been abolished but only failed for lack of support.
