TROUBLE IN LUMBER CAMP

EMPLOYEES AT VINCENT ARE CHARGED WITH ASSAULT.

Difficulty is Apparently Outgrowth of Claim for Overtime.

Wallowa, Aug. 8.—(Special)—Deputy Sheriff Henry Spence and Jerry Maxwell were called to Camp 5 of the Palmer Lumber company this morning at Vincent with warrants for the arrest of Frederick Basinger, Edgar Frost and Wm. McKinzie. The warrants charged the men with battery on Superintendent E. W. Barnes. The prisoners were brought before Justice McCran and pleaded not guilty. Bonds were furnished by friends of the accused and the trial was set for Thursday. From what can be learned from both sides of the case, the trouble arose over the question of overtime. Mr. Frost claiming sixteen hours overtime for the month of July.

CLUB WORK JOLTED.

Absence of County Fair Is Severe Disappointment to Children.

After a three-day tour of the valley visiting a majority of the 500 or so boys and girls who have been grooming garden, fruit, animal and other exhibits for the Boys and Girls' Industrial club shows this fall, L. J. Allen of O. A. C. reports keen disappointment among the children at the lack of a county fair this fall.

"Some splendid results are being attained by these clubs in this valley—nowhere have I seen better, but in company with County Superintendent of Schools Mrs. Ivanhoe I learned that the little folks are keenly disappointed. Just how the four winners will be determined that these may go to the Salem fair and compete for state prizes, I do not comprehend," said Mr. Allen. "The work is well started now, and what will become of it in the future with no fair apparent, I do not know. I fear club work has been seriously set back in this county."

"It would be a big relief if a children's industrial fair of even one day's duration was held and there let the young folks exhibit their products and thus the big aim of club work wouldn't be denied the participants."

PRACTICES THREE METHODS

MEDICINE, SURGERY AND OSTEOPATHY COMBINED.

Dr. Frank Ralston Will Conduct Unique Practice in This City.

The rather unique incident in healing circles of combining medicine, surgery and osteopathy will be instituted in La Grande as soon as the new Sommer building is finished. 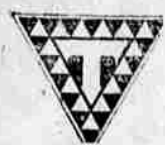
