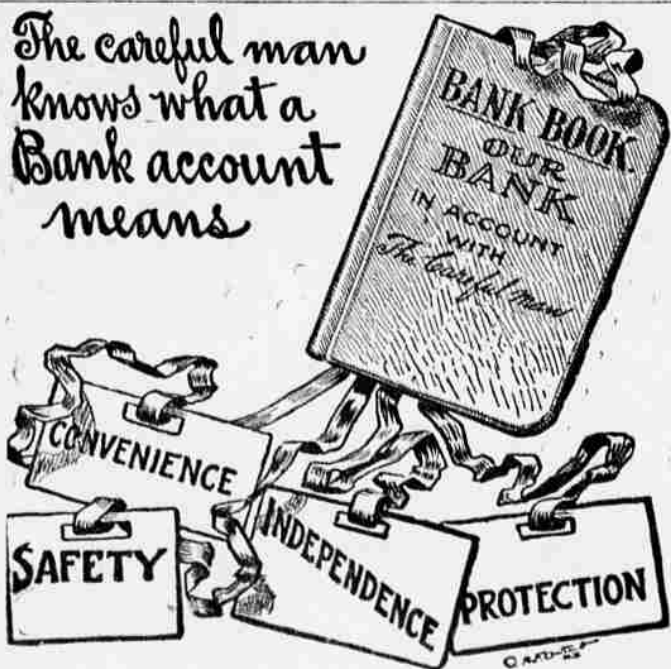
West's Crack Swimmers Compete
