Good Thing Yuan Died, Says Jap

Tokio, July 15.—(By mail)—"It is not easy to say whether the death of Yuan Shi Kai will prove advantageous to Japan. But I think it is fortunate for China that he died, in that his death helped to settle the troubled situation in that country."  
Baron Gonsake Hayashi, newly appointed Japanese minister to China, thus discussed the situation in the big republic in an interview here today. Baron Hayashi criticized the attitude of many Japanese towards China, but said he could not now say whether there will be a change in the policy of the Japanese government.

"Yuan Shi Kai went looking for trouble when he attempted to reestablish the monarchy," he said. "It is a question whether the warning given by the Japanese government was good or bad. If the warning had to be given, why was it not given in a sportsmanlike manner, instead of con-

Isn't it a fact that Japan really has no power to take the responsibility of guiding China? Intelligent Chinese merely laugh when they hear such a word used.  
"We have had our own troubles in raising our country to its present state. Before China can succeed in breaking away from the habits of 2,000 years ago many years must pass and she must go through many experiences."

Dug Trough Fortune in Graphite

Redding, Cal., Aug. 12.—Having dug his way through a ledge of graphite now worth a fortune, to reach a poor gold mine from which he has gotten a bare living for 14 years, A. E. Egerton of Whiskeytown has just sold his claim to H. C. Warneck of this city.

The graphite is valuable because the war has shut off importations from Germany.

When Egerton drove a tunnel into his gold mine over ten years ago, he cut a black ledge five feet in thickness. He passed up the "black stuff" as worthless and went on taking out gold, his tunnel finally penetrating the mountain 1000 feet. The black ledge, which was really graphite, was encountered ninety feet below the surface.

The name of the mine is "Aladdin's Lamp". The new owner proposes to put an auto truck line in service and ship the graphite to Redding for transportation to San Francisco by rail.
