## ARCADE

Realistic Battle Scenes in New Barricade Play.

Scenes which might have been taken on some battlefield of Europe are features of "Bullets and Brown Eyes," the new Triangle Kay Bee feature coming to the Arcade Wednesday and Thursday in which Bessie Barricade is starred. Practically every division of equipment used in modern warfare is shown in action. There are scouting aeroplanes, armored automobiles, a company of infantry on motorcycles, heavy artillery in action, and squads of cavalry. Producer Thomas H. Ince and Director Scott Sydney utilized nearly 1,000 men in the battle scenes. Besides these men, several hundred women and children appear in the production as peasants fleeing from their homes. In one scene, a battle in which several regiments of infantry are in a hand to hand battle, is depicted. Later the retreat of an army under the heavy fire of the enemy is shown.

Equipment for the army, including cannon, motorcycles, aeroplanes and all the paraphernalia of modern warfare are a part of the properties of the Inceville studio. Many former soldiers who had served in the various divisions of the United States army were employed during the making of the scenes.

### Bear Still Lies in Cradle of Sand.

Eureka, Cal., Aug. 11.—Further efforts made last night to move the stranded steamer Bear from its sandy cradle on the beach north of Cape Mendocino were rewarded with a movement of not more than one foot seaward. The tug Relief and the wrecking steamer Salvor joined at 8 o'clock in a united pull, which it was expected to take the derelict into deep water. Captain Logan, of Victoria, B. C., who is in charge of the wrecking operations, said that success of the venture depends entirely upon continuance of favorable weather, and that a storm at this stage would not only undo all the work that has been done, but would result in the failure of the enterprise.

### Open "Chevy Chase of the West."

Lake Geneva, Wis., Aug. 14.—Women rookies of the west, numbering about 300 will answer the call of reveille at 6:30 tomorrow morning at the women's military training camp established here—the Chevy Chase of the west. The women will do everything about the camp except cook. Cooks have been hired to get the meals but the women rookies will be given instruction in dietetics. Beside this they will be taught how to make surgical dressings, perform military drills, do ambulance driving and telegraphy. Of course there must be some men about the camp. But they will act as guards and patrol camp. They will not be allowed to enter the

regular camp grounds. The women, some of whom arrived here today, are equipped with regular uniforms, a double blanket, dressing robes, four sheets, two pillow cases, glass tumbler, underclothing, bloomers, high, fan lowheeled shoes, toilet articles and rubbers. "Lieut-Col" Vylla Poe Wilson has charge of the camp.



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
