Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 17.—Today is "registration day" in Walla Walla and the Republican organization has arranged to furnish autos from a headquarters to any and all who desire a ride to the city clerk's office and qualify for the coming elections. The registration has passed the 5000 mark and is increasing daily, there being unusual interest in the campaign.

#### Change To Be Made in Examinations.

Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—State Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill today announced that next year the questions for the teachers' examination on theory and practice will be taken from Gesell's "The Normal Child and Primary Education." #### Man Has Leg Fractured on Highway.

Troutlake, Wash., Aug. 17.—John Lane, of Underwood, a few days ago while coming from Underwood to Troutlake fractured one of his legs. He was hauling a well-drilling machine by truck from Underwood to the John Hall place here when his wagon seat slipped and he was thrown from the truck and was run over by the heavy wagon load of machinery. He was taken to White Salmon for treatment.

#### 879 Troopers Sent Home.

San Antonio, Tex., Aug. 17.—It was announced at department headquarters that to date a total of 879 guardsmen have been granted releases under the dependent relative provision. Officers do not consider this number as exceptionally large in view of the fact that approximately 100,000 state troops are engaged in border duty.

#### Raids Net Liquor in Hotels.

North Yakima, Wash., Aug. 17.—Deputies from the sheriff's office police, officers and a representative of the federal government, accompanied by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Oscar Schumann, raided the Moore hotel and annex early Tuesday morning and about noon they raided the Grand hotel. In the earlier raid an automobile load of liquor was confiscated, search of the Grand hotel netted 12 quart beer bottles filled with whiskey, several smaller lots of liquor and some cider which the officers believe contains alcohol and will have analyzed.

Ten arrests were made. J. L. Dye, known as "Curley Dye," and who was paroled two months ago from the state penitentiary, where he was serving a term for participation in a shooting affray in Tacoma, proprietor of the Moore hotel and also interested in the Annex, and Jack Connor, manager of the Annex were lodged in jail charged with selling intoxicating liquor, with having excess quantities of liquor in their possession and with running disorderly houses. Several of the other men were charged only with vagrancy and three women were booked on the same charge. These are the first raids made here since early in the year.

#### Woman's Party Organized and Ready.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 12.—Their new political party organized and a plan ready to force passage of the Constitutional suffrage amendment, the Woman's party, representing 12 suffrage states and claiming to control four million votes, started its third and last day's session today. Today's business is largely supplementary to that already transacted. Conferences were the keynote of the program. Three of them were to be held: The first a general conference on the coming campaign to be carried on by women, the second a conference of state chairman on campaign plans and the third a conference of national organizers on organization plans.

Mount Adams' Summit Conquered at Night.

Troutlake, Wash., Aug. 17.—A party of Portland people accompanied by R. M. Filloon, of Troutlake, as guide,

made the ascent of Mount Adams by moonlight Saturday morning. They left camp at 1 a. m., reaching the summit at 11 a. m., climbing a part of way by moonlight. The atmosphere was very clear until the summit was reached when a driving hailstorm was encountered, lasting for an hour, and it was intensely cold. The mountaineers found the Mazama box and register buried under two feet of ice. The men of the party cut the ice away and found the box had been filled with water and the registry book ruined because some unthinking person had left an indelible pencil in-

side, the lead of which having been dissolved had stained the writing so that it is illegible. The names of those who have climbed the mountain are now obliterated.

The Ridge of Wonders, Hell Roaring canyon and other places of interest were visited by the Portland party and a week of sightseeing was enjoyed. Camp was made near snowbanks 20 feet in depth, yet the atmosphere was very warm. Those in the party besides the guide were Mr. and Mrs. W. S.
