Indicating a general plentifulness of deer in the Blue mountains may be taken several items from Pendleton papers yesterday. Note some of them:

Hal Corby, well known Pendleton man, bagged what is thought to be the biggest buck of the season, yesterday at Fiddlers Hell Basin ten miles this side of La Grande. The animal weighed 350 pounds and was brought to Pendleton this morning by the proud hunter on train No. 17. R. Alexander and son Roy Alexander were treated to a venison feed today noon upon the arrival of Mr. Corby. Elmer Thomas, ranger at Duncan, in a spirit of jest, told Mr. Corby that he would pack out of the basin all of the big game that the latter would bring down and he was much surprised to be called at his joke this morning. Fred Hoskins of Echo and Ase Bowman accompanied by Mr. Corby on the trip.

Deer plenty are reported in the Bear Hollow section according to reports received here. According to Wes Matlock who was recently in that section he saw a herd of nine animals, four of them being bucks. He says he shot at them but failed to bring one down.

Regulations designating open seasons for hunting migratory birds under the new Federal migratory bird law were promulgated by Secretary Houston of the Agricultural department. They apply only in cases where equal protection to the birds is not provided under state laws, the state regulations governing where the open seasons they designate begin later or end earlier than the time stipulated in the Federal designations.

All insectivorous birds are protected indefinitely under the secretary's order and protection until September 1, 1918, is provided for band-tailed pigeons, cranes, wood ducks, swans, curlew, willet, upland plover and smaller shore birds.

Open seasons for other waterfowl, coots, gallinules, jacksnipes, black-breasted and golden plover, greater and lesser yellowlegs, rails and woodcocks, are designated state by state.
