OFFERINGS GENERALLY SWEET AND JUICY. Lemons Lock Arms with Upward Proression of Food Prices.

Home-grown corn of a sweet, juicy variety, usually, is generously offered on La Grande markets these days and the price is now 20 cents per dozen ears rather than 25 cents.

Lemons have joined the mad rush toward higher levels. Five cents per dozen on ordinary varieties was the extent of the increase the past few days.
