SIGNS ARE NEEDED.

La Grande Family Home From Trip Urges Quick Remedy.

After having been guided from Meacham to the Imperial hotel in Portland by the Blue Trail signs without asking a single question of anyone about the road. Mr. and Mrs. George H. Currey are home from an automobile tour into Willamette valley, regretting deeply the lack of signs along the way in Union county. "It is high time garages, commercial clubs or some organization or individual spent the necessary \$10 or \$20 to properly mark Union county" said Mr. Currey. "I met people in Portland who complained of the lack of signs in Union county—how they had wandered hither and there trying to get to La Grande and once in La Grande were unable to get out again. From Meacham on there is a sign a considerable distance before each cross road with the letter "R" or "L" telling you which way to turn to follow the Blue Trail which goes not only to Portland but into the city where garages and hotels are available—right up to the doors of these places. Mr. and Mrs. Currey motored down the Willamette valley as far as a point 12 miles north of Albany, stopping at the principal cities en route. On the return they went an unusual route, via Condon, being compelled to cross the famous Rock Creek divide between Condon and Heppner.

PREPARING EXHIBITS.

Three Different Groups Will Go to State Fair From This County.

Splendid progress is being made on the proposed exhibits from this county which will go forward to the state fair. Paul Spillman, county agriculturist, and J. K. Lantz of Cove, are now gathering up choice grains, grasses, corn, fruit and vegetables.
