### EX-RABBI WILL SPEAK SUNDAY

JEWIS WILL YET GAIN PALESTINE HE THINKS.

Cites to Fact that Great Numbers of Jews Suffer in Russia.

Joseph Goldman, an ex-rabbi from the Jewish synagogue of Russian Poland, will lecture Sunday night at the Methodist church and at 2 o'clock to a union service. His theme will be "Fulfillment of the Covenant."

The missionary had been a Jewish rabbi for 18 years and three and a half years ago became a Christian. He has been much persecuted by his own people and by the government. He came over to this country three years ago and began to study English. Since then he has written many books and translated others from the Hebrew. He carries credentials and letters from many prominent educators

vouching for him as an interesting speaker and a highly educated man. "My people in Russia have never had as much trouble in all the history of life as they have today" said Mr. Goldman this morning. "This people don't know how to appreciate the great freedom in the United States. Thousands of them are eating grass and cooking leaves for their children. They have no home and no place to rest. But they will some day get their Palestine back again. Something will open the way for them, after this war, no matter how it ends—

the Jewish nation will eventually get Palestine."

Mr. Goldman says that on this lecture tour 50,000 people have listened to him. In Walla Walla he spoke at the penitentiary to 800 and to large audiences in Peadleton. He is on his way to Colorado where he will lecture at the Bible university.

### HIGHER TAXES EXPLAINED.

Spokane Commissioner Blames Them to Public Demand for Luxury.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 3.—Charles M. Fassett, one of the five commissioners who govern Spokane, has issued an interesting statement showing how the tendency toward higher taxes in American cities the last few years has been caused by the demand for more conveniences and how the people of Spokane are getting more for their money than at any time in the history of the city. He sums it all up in the word "service."

"We sometimes hear people wonder what they are getting for their taxes, but a glance at Spokane's budget for the present year and the one proposed for next year will answer the question," states Commissioner Fassett. "Aside from the larger item of police and fire protection, street lighting, street cleaning, street repair and sprinkling, observe the many things that have been the outgrowth of the past five or six years.

"We have playgrounds, swimming pools, golf links, and free band concerts in the parks, drinking fountains on the street corners, numerous new concrete watering troughs for horses, comfort stations in the downtown district for men and women, free dental clinic for the care of the children's teeth, and enlarged facilities for furnishing free employment to men and women. We have free vaccination by the city health office, with board, medical attention and medicine without cost when a patient is taken to the city's contagion hospital. There is also medical diagnosis by the health office without cost in cases of suspected contagious disease.

"We now have three more fire stations than we had five years ago, policing a great area and carrying water to the remote corners of the city. We are maintaining three new library buildings, an enlarged emergency hospital with a physician and three nurses always at the service of the public. Free building permits are issued where we made a charge five years ago; gas, water, milk, food products and paving materials are tested by a city chemist.

"More money is given to charity, larger payments made to the state industrial insurance fund for the protection of city employees and a substantial contribution made by taxation to the water department for the water appropriated for public use.

"The city is carrying its share of the cost of improved lighting in the downtown streets, has more modern apparatus for fighting fire and more fire hydrants for the distributing of water at fires. A civil service division is maintained where very citizen is

free to enter in examinations for employment with the city.

"Nearly all of these things have been the outgrowth of the past five years and go to show the extent of the service being rendered by the Spokane city government."

### Much Stock on Ranges

Portland, August 29.—Figures just compiled in the office of the District Forester, George H. Cecil, Portland, Oregon, show that 157,689 cattle and horses, and 996,771 sheep and goats, belonging to 3,454 permittees, were admitted to the National Forest ranges of Oregon and Washington during the period July 1, 1915, to June 30, 1916.

These figures give an increase of 20,834 cattle and horses, and a decrease of 11,669 sheep and goats, compared with the number submitted dur-

ing the preceding fiscal year. The decrease in sheep is accounted for by the fact that many sheep men have gone into the cattle business. The figures as a whole show a big increase in the number of stock on the forests of the district. Since four sheep are considered equal to one cow on a range basis, after deducting the 11,669 decrease in sheep, the figures show an increase equivalent to 71,667 sheep.

The returns also show that during the 1915 season the stock grazed belonged to 2,962 owners, but this year 3,454 owners are represented, indicating clearly that the Forest Service is steadily carrying out its policy of making the widest distribution among the small ranchers adjoining the forest. Six years ago there were 1,683 grazing permittees using the National Forest ranges of the two states.
