CONCERT AT PARK

Modern Woodmen Will Have Elks' Band As Finishing Number

A special feature in the way of music has been provided for those who attend the Modern Woodman picnic at Riverside park next Monday which begins at noon and to which all Woodmen, Royal Neighbors and their friends in the whole county are invited. The speaking, drill, public initiation, male choruses, and vocal solos set for the evening, will be concluded at 8:45 so that the Woodmen will have opportunity to hear a band concert especially for them. various states were interviewed frequently and were in numerous consultations with the chairmen, so that when congress acts upon the eight-hour law introduced last evening, the salons will already have all the information available upon the subject and it is anticipated by Mr. Hughes that a vote will be taken early. He is of the opinion that the law will pass with a great majority; if put to a vote, as the brotherhoods have been advised that the senators generally favor the eight-hour principle. Of Oregon's delegation Representative Pat McArthur of Multnomah county is the only member which has not come out flatfootedly in favor of the principle, it is reported. Mr. Hughes said:

"President Wilson has adopted a policy of mediation that involves the eight-hour principle, with pro rata pay for over time until the whole question of overtime is arbitrated, and has stood upon that throughout. The railroad presidents jockeyed with the President for a week, in the meantime building their trenches behind them for action. They attempted to compromise the President both with the public and the employees.

"It was found in the official arbitration and investigation during the engineers' controversy with the roads in 1915 upon established proof that 78 per cent of the roads in the country are running on a speed basis of 12 1-2 miles and hour. In all such cases the eight-hour day will make no additional cost to the companies, as that is the speed necessary under the eight-hour day to accomplish what is done in a 10-hour day. Forty per cent of the railroads already have the eight-hour day. Hence it is the 60 per cent that is involved and 22 per cent that will have to meet higher wages or rush its trains along to get over the same territory in shorter hours."
