Jane Grey and William Desmond, both popular favorites of the speaking stage, will be presented Wednesday and Thursday at the Arcade by Thomas H. Ince as co-stars in an original human interest drama from the pen of J. C. Hawks, of the Ince staff of photoplay-writers. The production will be released as a Triangle-Kay Bee feature under the title "Waifs."

"Waifs" is the pathetic story of a young Episcopal clergyman's decline because of his inadvertent use of

CAUTION IS URGED

Use of Cars Should be Expedited to Relieve Car Shortage

Notice has been sent to all agents by General Passenger Agent William McMurray urging publicity of the suggestion that shippers expedite the time cars are held. Concerning this point the notification to agents goes on to say:

"Under date of August 10th, Mr. George B. McGinty, Secretary of the Interstate Commerce Commission, issued a circular relative to the threatened car shortage, as follows:

"Reports are being received by the Commission indicating that a 'car shortage' is again threatened, caused in part by the heavy movements of grain at this season of the year.

"The Commission therefore takes this opportunity of again bringing to the attention of the carriers and shippers the necessity for close supervision of the methods of loading, unloading and moving of cars so as to secure the fullest possible use of available equipment.

"Shippers should endeavor to secure the prompt and full loading of cars, and consignees their prompt unloading and release.

"The Commission feels justified in urging upon shippers and consignees that they shall not use cars for storage purposes but should endeavor to release them as promptly as possible and not avail themselves of the full limit of free time provided by the tariffs.

"Carriers should also make every endeavor to eliminate delays and expedite the movement of shipments. Cars should be promptly returned to the home line, company material promptly unloaded, and close supervision given to operations at terminals.

"Individual shippers and their associations and the carriers should cooperate in order that the delays and losses consequent to a shortage of cars may, so far as possible, be avoided. By the commission: George B. McGinty, Secretary."

No Auto Races.
New York, Sept. 5.—The Trade Racing association has announced it has abandoned the plan to hold a 24-hour automobile race on the Sheepshead bay speedway this fall. Manufacturers of automobiles, officials of the association say failed to give the plan any support and no entries were made. An attempt may be made to hold the race next year.
