BIG VOLUME OF SHIPPING

UNEXPECTED NUMBER OF HOGS OFFERED.

Cattle Not So Plentiful—Sheep About Normal.

Portland, Sept. 4.—In general there was a fairly steady tone in the cattle market at North Portland for the week's opening. Receipts were slightly below those of last Monday, this being due to the fact that many interior cattle shippers had been informed that no Sunday train would be run to this city.

Mutton and Lambs Steady.

Aside from the contract stuff, there was little reported in the North Portland sheep and lamb trade over Sunday. General trade conditions are practically the same as last week.

There was an unexpectedly heavy run of hogs in the North Portland yards over Sunday, total run being 2328 head compared with 1831 head last week and 2248 head for this same day a year ago.

There was considerable weakness in the market at the start of the day's trading with values sharply lower, although for a time it was hard to tell exactly what the extreme top was. Some excellent quality hogs sold early in the day around \$9.65 or 20c below the extreme top of last week.

AUTO TRIP ENDS.

Westfall Family Have Enjoyable Automobile Trip.

Imbler, Sept. 2.—(Special)—Thursday ended the six-weeks tour enjoyed by Walter Westfall and family, journey covering 2141 miles and made entirely in a new Dodge touring car. Mr. Westfall kept an itemized account of car expenditures, the total being \$40.21 for the entire distance. One hundred and twenty-one gallons of gasoline were used, making an average of over 17 miles per gallon, and costing from 22 1-2 to 40 cents per gallon. No tire trouble was encountered not even a puncture. During the six weeks the tourists visited points in Idaho, spent a week trout fishing near Burleigh, camped in Yellowstone park, and on the return trip, went by way of Butte, Mont., and Spokane, Wash., coming into the Grande Ronde valley by way of the Toll gate road. Mr. Westfall said that the first glimpse of old Mt. Emily as they came over the divide was a most welcome sight. George Wade and family accompanied the tourists on part of the trip, the entire party having an extra car for camp outfit and supplies.

Headers, threshers and combines are rapidly disposing of the wheat crop, but threshing will probably last several weeks yet. Frank McKinnis is storing about 4000 bushels which with his last year's yield, makes nearly 10,000 bushels he will have to place on the market.

Some local inconvenience is already being experienced on account of the railroad trouble. Miss Blanch Tuttle is due in Seattle at the opening of the fall semester in the University of Washington but will not start till the strike is settled. Several parties were compelled to cancel vacation trips.

Many ranchers are now harvesting the third cutting of alfalfa and report the hay as being of excellent quality. Mrs. Ray Norval's mother who underwent an operation for gall stones at the La Grande hospital a few days ago, is improving nicely.

Teachers are arriving ready for the school opening on the 4th. Harold L. Moss coming from Guthrie Center, Iowa, to teach science and mathematics and Miss Lucile Cordery from Adams, Oregon, to handle grade work. A few pupils are writing on the state questions this week.

Miss Elva Conklin left for Flora, Oregon, where she has a position as grade teacher in the public school.
