PICNIC WAS BIG AFFAIR

AUDIENCE AT NIGHT NUMBERS ABOUT 400

County Organization Completed—Best Drilled Members Picked.

In the face of stormy weather the day before, the Modern Woodman picnic at Riverside park yesterday afternoon and evening was a big success. At the noon hour guests from county points and La Grande assembled about a festival board. In the afternoon a sport program was carried out with good amusement resulting.

In the evening hour supper was enjoyed by various groups of people and by 7:15 the program was under way. The evening's entertainment was begun when H. E. Dixon, presiding officer, called on Miss Iva Wilson for a piano solo, which she delivered with much satisfaction, responding to an encore. Axtel Osterholm of McMinnville sang a most pleasing bass solo, responding to an encore. Bruce Dennis spoke a few minutes, citing many of the reasons why the Modern Woodman lodge is the largest fraternal insurance order in the world with a membership of over a million and a half men. He also spoke of the duties of Royal Neighbors and their mission. H. C. Vinacke, chairman of the day, then awarded the prizes for the afternoon sports.

Mrs. George Huntington Curry sang a vocal solo, being called out the second time to "give more."

At this point the drills for the evening were introduced.

The Royal Neighbors, under the direction of Mrs. Nelson, executed some really remarkable evolutions, judges headed by Captain Lee Clark the meanwhile selecting the best drilled woman in the group.
