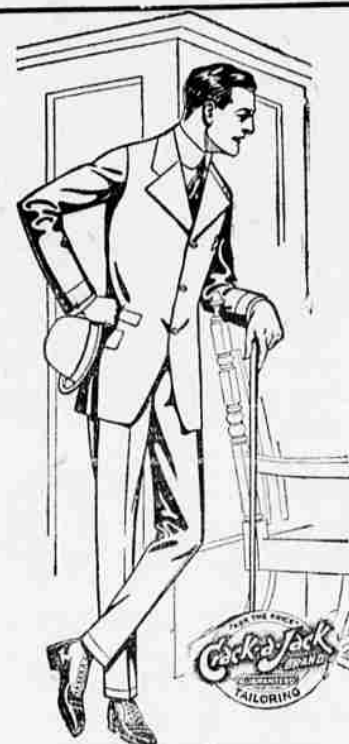

Methodists Pay Tribute to Memory of the Preacher of the Wilderness
Pleasant Hill Pleasant Plains, Ill., Sept. 5.—Hundreds of persons in this section of Illinois today made a pil-

grimage to the grave of Peter Cartwright, the preacher of the wilderness who, in pre-Civil war days taught religious duties to the people of the Central part of Illinois.

Hundreds of persons attending the 93rd Methodist conference at Springfield came here to pay their respects to the memory of the pioneer preacher.

The preacher was a candidate for congress against Abraham Lincoln in 1864. He is looked upon as having been one of the greatest churchmen of the Methodist faith.

Among those here today were members of the Illinois Historical society including Senator Lawrence Y. Sherman, State Treasurer Russell, President James of Illinois University and former Governor Yates.

Refuses to Give Up Child She Adopted

Topeka, Kansas, Sept. 6.—The refusal of Mrs. Ida Spencer to surrender to the Canadian nuns, from whom she adopted her, the six year old girl orphan in her home here, may become an international incident, interested attorneys said today. The child is a British subject, but a living here. Mrs. Mrs. Spencer adopted her from the Canadian orphanage she was a baby in arms. She has had the child for more than five years but the Canadian nuns, who under Canadian law have the right to recall any orphan to them before they become of age, want her back. Mrs. Spencer says she will not give up the child and that if they want her they will have to fight to get her.

VILLA PLAYING GAME

Military Authorities Claim Villa Menace Is Only Rumor
El Paso, Sept. 6.—Gen. Funston has called reports of new Villa menace "rumors". Military authorities, believe Villa is preparing a new blow to affect the Mexican-American commission's proceedings. One officer said Carranza troops are avoiding Villa, since being severely defeated. He wants a force of American troops to advance through Mexico to embroil Carranza and America.
