COMMISSION SESSION BUSY

CITY MANAGER'S SALARY IS
PLACED AT \$150.

Commissioners to Enforce Sewer Connections Rigidly.

Reading of bills, monthly reports, the Beaver creek dam, and final ratification of J. E. Foley's appointment as city manager constitute a few of the vital questions before the City commission at its meeting last night. Fire Chief Mackey reported six calls during the past month. A petition for a new arc light at North Fourth and Y streets was de-

ferred until the final adjustment of city lights is made.

The petition and recommendations of P. M. Williams as city manager was read and placed on file. The appointment of J. E. Foley as city manager was ratified.

Two bids were filed for the construction of the small piece of sewer in Sewer Dist. 1, Sec. 6. George Gordon of Portland who is building the South La Grande sewer offered to do the work for \$445.80 and Jack Childs of La Grande for \$465.40. Mr. Gordon's bid was accepted.

A resolution placing the salary of City Manager J. E. Foley at \$150.00 was adopted.

In order that the gas franchise may properly be put through the necessary red tape, it was ordered published and after 20 days it will be considered by the commission and if no serious objection is raised it will be passed. The publication will take place Saturday of this week. A resolution was passed cancelling

Improvement bonds No. 180-194 amounting to \$2500 and interest.

Objection to odoriferous refuse heaps in certain parts of the city was heard and the city manager instructed to investigate.

Concerning the sidewalk in front of the A. S. Geddes property the city engineer and manager will investigate the correctness of the present grade, and if proper, construction may proceed.

Architect Block presented his plans and specifications for the construction of the city heating plant in the city building and the commission adopted them and if the manager passes his O. K. bids will be advertised for soon.

The question of hitching racks came up again for consideration and it is likely that this very serious problem will be taken up jointly with the Commercial club.

The chief of police was instructed to most rigidly enforce connection with sewers and removal of out buildings.

The curfew law was discussed, particularly as to more rigid enforcement of it.

The commissioners and the city manager will go to view the intake dam in a few days and then will be in position to act more intelligently upon this much-mooted question.

The question of painting the center of intersections for the assistance of automobile traffic in turning properly was discussed and generally deemed practical. No official action was taken.

THOMPSON TRIAL BEGINS

Deputy Sheriff Recites How Automobile and Woman Were Found

Hillsboro, Sept. 7.—James L. Andrews, a deputy sheriff, was the first witness in the Bennett Thompson trial charged with murdering Mrs. Helen Jennings and Fred Ristman. Andrews described the finding of Ristman's bloody jitney behind the house and discovering Mrs. Jennings dead on the bed, her head smashed. The audience was mostly women.

Farmer Killed by a Bull.
Clifford Smith, a farmer aged 42, was fatally injured by being gored by an angry bull on the farm of Victor Yates near Oakville, thirteen miles south of Albany, Wednesday night.

Eugene Man Stricken.
Eugene Bosse, connected with the chamber of commerce of Eugene, was stricken with apoplexy in a Portland hotel Wednesday. His condition is serious.

Body Has Been Recovered.

The body of A. B. Richardson, realty dealer of Portland who was drowned while swimming in the Willamette last Saturday, has been recovered after a search of several days.

One Divorce to Three Weddings.
Columbus, O., Sept. 7.—For every three marriages in Ohio last year, at least one divorce suit was started. For every six marriages, one divorce was granted by Ohio courts and one marriage annulled. These figures

will be cited in the forthcoming report of Secretary of State Charles Q. Hildebrand, soon to be filed with Governor Willis, it was learned here today. Ten years ago Ohio had only one divorce to every 12 marriages. Annual reports of the former secretaries show plainly the divorce evil is gaining ground in Ohio married life. Hildebrand's report shows it is the wife and not the husband, as generally it is supposed, who tires soonest of the marriage bond. For example: Exactly 299 divorces were granted husbands last year on the ground that their wives had been un-

faithful. Only 196 wives were granted divorces from husbands charged with forgetting their marriage vows. However, it is the husband who shirks married responsibility first according to the report. Exactly 3014 divorces were granted wives last year for "absence and neglect," as against 1354 granted husbands for the same reason. Hildebrand's report shows that June still holds good as the month of marriages and that January is the month that Cupid languishes. On the 48,260 marriages reported for the year, 5820 were solemnized in June, while January's record was only 2875.
