New Danish Rigsdag to Meet.

Copenhagen, Sept. 8.—It is announced that the new Danish Rigsdag is to meet November 1 to discuss the proposed sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States for 25 million dollars. The Rigsdag is the Danish Congress. The House of Representatives is called the Folkething. It will recruit new members at an election in October. The Senate is called the Landsting. Election to member-

ship therein will be held about the same time. Although there has been some argument as to the price to be given for the islands and some hints of pressure by the United States having been brought to bear upon Denmark to force the sale of the islands, it is not expected that there will be an opposition to the sale's completion.
