Demon Rum Press Agent Has Y. M. C. A. Brand Now
Clinton Wunder, a graduate of the University of Cincinnati who until recently was publicity manager for the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' Association, today becomes one of the religious secretaries of the West Side Y. M. C. A., No. 318 West Fifteenth Street. He succeeds the Rev. Charles A. Ross, who becomes pastor of the Congregational church at Massena, N. Y.

"During my college course I was an active Christian and wanted to be a professor of sociology," said Mr. Wunder yesterday. "I did social work for two months after leaving college. Then I got the idea I wanted to make big money. The opportunity came to do campaign work for the 'wets' in the first 'wet' fight in Ohio in 1914. I made a hit. Then I took part in such campaigns all over the country and the next year organized and conducted the speakers' bureau for the 'wets' in the second Ohio fight."

"I received a big salary from the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' Association. But finally I realized what it says in Timothy: 'For the love of money is the root of all evil.' I decided to go back to Christ."

U. S. Is Driving "Medicine Man" From Reserves

Even the Indian Medicine man is passing away. The white man who banished his red brother to a few reservations scattered through the country has now superseded the time-honored dispenser or sickness upon whom the Indians relied in days past to cure their ills.

Under the supervision of the department of the interior a vigorous campaign to check tuberculosis and trachoma, which are spreading rapidly among the Indians, has been started. The number of regular agency physicians has been increased from 89 to 130, and contract physicians from 53 to 76. The appropriation for

relief of distress has been increased from \$200,000 to \$350,000, while many additional field nurses and matrons will be employed during the coming years in the effort to furnish the best possible service to the Indians. The red man has learned in the past few years to turn to the white man's physicians when in sickness. New hospitals are being erected and equipped on many of the western reservations. In Montana a hospital has been built on the Blackfoot reservation, and a new one is being constructed for the Flathead Indians at Fort Spokane. On the western Shoshone reservation in Idaho a day school is being remodeled into a hospital.

A special effort is being made to reduce infant mortality among the Indians in order to perpetuate the race, while campaigns for sanitary clean-ups of the camps and reservations are being made to improve the conditions under which the Indians live. Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, has impressed upon his department that a sick Indian is an economic loss to his family and tribe. Hence the preventive measures which have been adopted all over the country.
