Enlists Country in "America First" Campaign

On September first the United States Bureau of Education in the Department of the Interior begins its nation-wide campaign to induce 3,000,000 non-English-speaking immigrants to attend night school and learn the language of America.

The Commissioner of Education has designated men dealing with the immigrants' problems from every angle to serve a National Committee of One Hundred to further the purposes of the

campaign. This section is the result of resolutions adopted by two Americanization conferences held during the recent meetings of the National Education Association in New York, at which times it was cited that the removal of the inability of the foreign-born residents to speak English could be hastened by concerted effort and cooperation of all interested agencies and individuals working intensively on a nation-wide basis prior to and immediately subsequent to the opening of evening schools in October.

Letters of an appointment have been sent to representative industrial leaders, educators, labor and immigration officials, state officials, editors, officers of patriotic, civic and racial organizations and public spirited citizens in every section of the United States. The function of the committee will be to cooperate with the Bureau in enlisting the active interest of school superintendents, chambers of commerce, commercial organizations, industrial establishments, labor unions and private organizations.

For the purpose of enlisting native and foreign-born American citizens in the "America First" Campaign an enrollment blank headed "Sign this card and join the Americanization movement" will be used. Thousands of these cards, asking each signer for his personal help, will be disseminated in states and cities where immigrants reside. Through the active assistance secured in this manner the Bureau expects to be able to reach thousands of immigrants which it could reach in no other way. Cooperating sub-committees will be appointed in the principal immigrant communities.

San Francisco Boy Wins Competition. New York, Sept. 5.—Harold von

Schmidt of San Francisco won the \$1,000 prize in the National Poster competition of the Society for Electrical Development against a field of 781 designs, some of them from the brushes of world famous poster painters, it was announced here today. Von Schmidt was unknown to the world of art until today. He works for a San Francisco architect. Von Schmidt calls his poster "The Modern Aladdin." It represents Aladdin touching a button instead of rubbing his lamp, and the herculean Genie "Electricity" pops forth and salaams to him. The design, in six colors, will be reproduced more than 200 million times to advertise "America's Electrical Week," Dec. 2-9. Of the 781 designs considered by the Art committee, 352 of them were by women. William E. McKee, a high school boy at Hollywood, Mass., is winner of the sixth prize, \$50. High school students submitted 204 posters, many of which received honorable mention in the report. Other prize winners leading the list announced today are:

Vincent Aderente, New York, \$300; Edward Staloff, Jersey City, \$200; Harold H. Kolb, Somerville, Mass., \$100; Armand Moreda, Brooklyn, \$25; Ruth M. Jamison, Buffalo, \$15 and Edna E. Crowley, Chicago, \$10.

Governor Plays Cupid.

Tokio, Sept. 12.—Another step in the plan of the Japanese Government to bring about the amalgamation of the peoples of Japan and Korea was announced today. Prince Li, heri of the former Emperor of Korea, will soon marry a Japanese Princess of the Blood. The Emperor already has sanctioned the match and the date for the wedding will be announced in a few months. The match, which will be largely of a political nature was arranged by Marshal Count Terauchi, governor general of Korea who came to Tokio a few months ago in the role of Cupid. After the marriage the young prince, who is now serving in the Imperial army, will reside in Tokio, with a villa in Seoul. The former emperor of Korea also may move to Tokio to spend his declining years. The heir apparent has been educated in Japanese schools and has adopted Japanese customs and attire. He is said to be handsome.
