## Sporting News

New York, Sept. 13.—Maurice E. McLoughlin, once known as the greatest lawn tennis player in the world, may not again be in a national tournament. The California Comet, as he was known at the height of his brilliant career, made this assertion just after he walked off the courts at Forest Hills the afternoon of Sept. 1, a beaten man, eliminated by George Church, the wonderful New Jersey player. The defeat of McLoughlin was characterized by himself as the saddest blow he ever has had to endure. "There never was anything I wanted more than this one more championship, not even the Davis Cup matches two years ago," he said. "I want to come back next year. I love the game and want to play again in national tournaments but my business in California probably will make it impossible for me to." McLoughlin and Thomas Bundy, formerly a tennis player with a national reputation, are running a sporting goods house in San Francisco. McLoughlin's defeat at the hands of Church also may play a big part in determining his future course. He was on the rubbing table immediately after his game with Church, when he did his talking. There was no attempt to furnish an alibi for his work in that contest. In fact, he declared he didn't want the tennis fans, who have been so loyal to him, to believe he was making excuses for his work, or trying to belittle the game of the easterner. "I realize I haven't the speed I once had," said he. "My greatest fault in that match was that I was unable to sustain my game. I tried hard to pull the ball to where I wanted it, naturally, but it wouldn't go. Also, apparently, I have not the strength nor the knack of smashing back that I used to have," he added wearily.

Princeton, N. J., Sept. 13.—Captain Frank Trevor Hogg, 11, of the 1916 Princeton football team, assembled his warriors today for first practice. Nearly 100 men responded. Hogg faces a big job to make a winning team, but while the material is only average, the coaching staff is unusual. Eleven first string men were lost from last year's team, but the substitutes were high class. Quarterback, ends and tackles are the weak points here. Half backs and fullback should be the teams' strong points. At the Guard positions Hogg and Norse doubtless will continue. The first game is scheduled with Holy Cross Sept. 30, and one with North Carolina university October 7. It is too early to predict the effect the six months' lapse since spring practice will have on the Tiger footballers. At quarterback: Ames, Haas, Eberstadt and Eddy. For the other backfield positions: Driggs, Tibbott, Moore and possibly Eddy are available. Alan Brown, 17, is apt to break into this combination and Thomas and Good speed, 1918, and E. A. George and Richard Cleveland, son of the late President, two of last year's freshmen eleven, have shown ability. Higley is a possibility for a wing position. Speedy Rush, Princeton '98, again heads the coaching staff.

Rules Are Set for Pendleton Athletes Pendleton, Sept. 12.—High school boys in this city who smoke or drink will have no chance to accumulate student honors either in the way of winning student body offices, or in athletics. Such is the order made by City Superintendent Parks. He states that no athlete or student body officer would be allowed to maintain his position if found to be either a drinker or a smoker. He further states that if any athlete is found

smoking on any trip, the game in which he plays will be forfeited to the opposing team.

There is considerable speculation as to whether or not the rule can be enforced, but it is certain that a partial enforcement can be effected, for a number of high school athletes have expressed their approval.

Lee Caldwell Is Agam Champion.

Lee Caldwell, Pendleton boy who won the championship of the world in

the bucking contest at the Round-Up last year, last week added another title to his long string when he won the championship of the southwest in a contest held at Garden City, Kans. News of his victory was received in a telegram from him today by Hamley & Co. He stated in his telegram that he would be home in a few days.

Only last month Caldwell won the Canadian championship at Moose Jaw, wrestling it from Emory Le Grande who had held it for two years. Besides these titles, he has won the right to be called champion of the northwest and of the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Nevada and Montana. Undoubtedly he has won more honors in bucking contests than any other cowboy.

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
