His Histrionic Talent Masters His Reason.

William Farnum finds that strength is not always an asset. It has taken the moving picture to bring this confession from him.

In so many of the William Fox pictures, in which Mr. Farnum appears, he has to fight to see that right triumphs in the end. There are always villains who get in the way, and these

men must be ruthlessly hurled aside, before the path of virtue.

This is what has made strength a handicap to William Farnum. He tries to be gentle with his opponent, but it is like a lion trying to be kind to a mouse. He finds that the claws will glide forth, often before he knows it, and it requires the fullest lung-power of his director to recall them. That is the pathetic side of William Farnum, the man of power.

There was "A Soldier's Oath," in which Farnum had to strangle the man whose crime had condemned him, an innocent man, to life imprisonment. His histrionic ability mastered his sense of the unreal, and Farnum found, after the scene had been played, that Herman J. Herbert, who played the part of Lazare, was almost blue in the face.

Then came "Fighting Blood," with a similar motive running through it. Once more Farnum, in the role of Lem Hardy, was unjustly sent to prison. He comes from confinement a new man, converted to a love for the Bible by the faith and humanity of the prison chaplain. He found that his first sermon was almost broken up by a gang of toughs, who came to the church to nag the new minister. His fighting blood got the better of him, and single-handed he rushed at the crowd. They dispersed hurriedly. After the film had been taken for this scene three of the intruders found themselves bruised more than their contract had called for. It was another instance of Farnum's powerful strength conquering the man.

"The Bondman" had another fighting scene of enormous moment. It began with a wrestling match between Stephen Arry (William Farnum) and Patriksen, a champion. Stephen came off victorious and then had to fight Patriksen's brother, who was furious on learning that the championship had passed from his family. The men who played the part of the fighters were especially selected for their large frames and strength. At last, the director thought, Farnum would meet an equal. But the bout was almost child's play for the actor. He came forth from the two combats, fresh as he had entered, ready to tackle all comers. And his opponents had injuries to show that they had played their parts obediently.

Proposes to Stop British Blacklist. Buenos Aires, Sept. 14.—Representative Avellaneda is waging a vigorous fight in the Argentine congress for passage of a bill, introduced by himself, prohibiting in this country

all commercial practices of the nature involved in the British blacklist of enemy firms in business in foreign countries. For violations of the proposed prohibition, the bill provides a maximum fine of 2,000 pesos, (\$880), imprisonment up to six months and cancellation of the offending firm's charter to transact business in the country. Avellaneda is ex-Speaker of the Argentine house of Representatives and one of the most influential of its members. His bill is considered to stand an excellent chance of adoption.
