TWO TRAINS WILL GO FROM LA
GRANDE TO PENDLETON.

All Possible Advantages Arranged
for Visitors to Big Show.

There will be two special trains
from La Grande to the Pendleton
Round-Up. The first special will
leave La Grande at 7 o'clock next
Thursday morning, the opening day
for the big show. Visitors on this
train may stay in Pendleton one day,
two days or through the whole season.
The second special train will leave La
Grande Saturday morning at 7 o'clock.
This is the last day of the Round-Up
and the special of that day will re-
turn at 11 p. m., giving all visitors
the opportunity to take in the Happy
Canyon and all other special features
of the great event.

The round trip fare on either of the
special trains from La Grande will be
\$3.00.

These excursions to Pendleton are

being promoted by the La Grande
Speed 'Em Up club under direction of
Roscoe Neal and Harris French. The
club members are anxious for a large
delegation in recognition, for one
thing, of Pendleton's fine turn out to
the recent motorcycle races, and be-

Surface Finally Is Out as Zoologist

Harrisburg, Sept. 15.—Having
weathered four investigations of the
affairs of his office, since he took it in
1903 and stuck tight to it, Dr. H. A.
Surface, Pennsylvania's State Eco-
nomic Zoologist, gave up the fight to-
day and stepped out. Dr. Surface
was succeeded by J. G. Sanders, form-
erly head of the same bureau for the
state of Wisconsin. Dr. Surface was
asked to resign by the Agricultural
commission. Governor Brumbaugh
declined to interfere and the board
made no explanatory statement. One
probe of this office was public, but
the other three were private. He
weathered all of them but decided he
would not put up a fifth fight to re-
tain his office.

Clubs to Discuss Paper Famine.

Atlantic City, Sept. 12.—George H.
Gardner of Cleveland will deliver an
address on the Paper Situation before
the convention of the United Typothe-
tae and Franklin clubs of America
which convened here today, which is
expected to start the general discus-
sion of a probe into the paper famine
and other serious business problems of
the printing and publishing business
caused, or said to have caused, by the
war. The association is the national
body of the employing printers of the
country. It is to be their 30th annual
convention. The print paper situa-
tion, recently investigated by the fed-
eral government and the subject of
consideration at all gatherings of
printers and publishers this year,
probably will be concretely acted upon
by the convention. Papers in every
part of the country have been com-
pelled to reduce their size; printing
prices, which never did provide any
too good a margin for the printer any-

how, have been boosted perforce and
may go higher. Good inks are as
scarce as is good paper. A report
will be made tomorrow by Secretary
J. A. Borden, of Chicago. "The Dan-
gers of Modern Economic Policies as
Pertaining to the Printer" was the
topic discussed by A. E. Ommen of

New York City at the morning session
today. Fletcher Ford of Los An-
geles will address the convention
Thursday on "Printers' Credit Pro-
and Con." President Albert W. Fin-
lay, of Boston, will be chief entertain-
er at the closing session Thursday
evening.
