



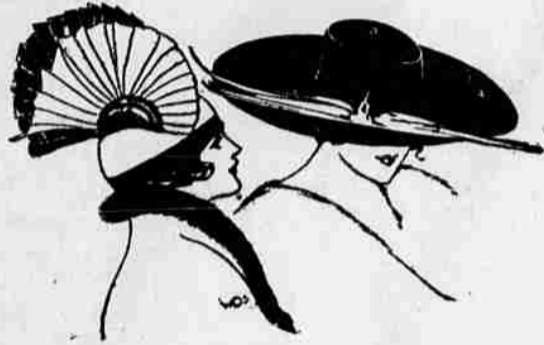

GRAIN YIELD FAIR

Results to Wallowa Farmers Likely to be Larger Than Last Year

While the grain yield of Wallowa county does not promise to equal that of last year in quantity or quality, the results in dollars and cents probably will be greater, declares the Enterprise Chieftain. Wheat has been above \$1.20 a bushel for more than a week and many persons count on it going to \$1.50. That will make a market at high prices for every kernel of grain the county can spare. The chief adverse factor this year is found in the dry weather last autumn and the backward spring following. Farmers did not get in nearly as much winter wheat as they would have liked, and then the spring was so long in getting down to good growing weather that this year's sowing was several weeks behind the average. Rains through the summer kept the grain green, and much of it is still standing, and good harvest weather is probably toward a close. There also was a light frost late in August.

All over the county farmers are working as hard as they can in their grain fields, some cutting and binding, some heading, others running combines, or threshing. The threshing results would sound good in old

states of the east but they are not up to the last year's figures for Wallowa county.

In Leap and Chapman district the yield is generally quite satisfactory, running over 30 bushels. J. W. and Albert Childers on Trout creek got a little better than 30 bushels. E. A. Crossler's wheat turned out 33 bushels and O. L. Harmon and son had a field that made 35. Frank Downing reported 40 bushels.

The valleys reported 40 bushel wheat on farms that were very well managed, and there is some good barley.

Paradise, Lost Prairie, Grouse, Eden, Promise and the benches of the Grande Ronde valley report fair yields, particularly at the lower levels. On the intermediate benches 30 bushels probably is more like the figure, and at the top levels there is wheat that will not run quite that good. Winter wheat has been put in already on the lower Paradise benches, and it stands five inches or so above the ground, giving a fine promise of a crop next year.

The hills east of Enterprise had a more than fair prospect a few weeks ago, and many fields will turn out 35 bushels or better, but the quality may not be of the best in all cases. However it will be good enough to command a high price on the present market. Threshing is just starting there.

There is considerable smut in some parts of the north end. With careful threshing this can be handled so as not to cut the price.

The Temperance Movement in France

In a time when the very existence of the French nation depends upon the sobriety of its people, it required a year's struggle to win from the cabinet temperance legislation which simply forbids the sale of spirituous drinks and wines containing more than 15 per cent of alcohol to women, children and soldiers! And subsequent official circulars have weakened these orders.

But before the war such halting measures would have seemed to belong to the realm of dreams, so far in advance as it of any previous legislation, and manifesting such a radical change in French customs. The most hopeful phase is that this legislation was won through the co-operation of ten thousand different societies, and that the number of persons who favored the measures exceeded two million.

With practically every man in France performing his full measure of military service for his country, it follows naturally that the temperance movement is largely a feminist movement.

"I will do anything for my country and everything against alcohol. I have given one son to France, and the other is at the front; but France must pledge its mothers that when our sons have driven out the invading foe they shall not return to the menace of a greater foe within—alcohol," said a mother whose mourning garb attested her right to urge, with other mothers of France, the request that the government, whose life has been saved through the blood of their sons, shall

repay the sacrifice by assuring their immunity from the ravage of a greater enemy—alcohol.

And so a call was issued for a mass meeting of women at the Sorbonne, April 2. Four thousand women responded. It was an audience of the representative women of France. General Mallette, the only man present served as chairman. Amid great enthusiasm the Union of the Women of France Against Alcohol was formed. The officers of fourteen leading organizations of French women have signed an appeal, which is being sent out to the women of France. It is a marvelous document issued in behalf of a marvelous movement in France's most critical hour, and has already become historic.—The Christian Herald.

Pendleton the Mecca Now

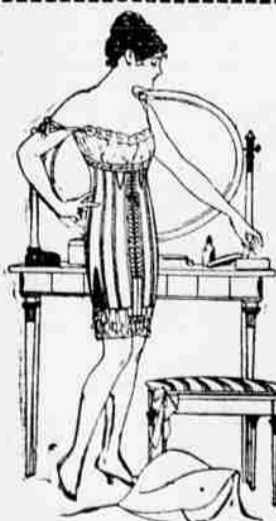
